### **1. Parkridge Plans Homes Tour for Centennial Expo**

Parkridge Community Organization (PCO) on October 12 will conduct a tour of late 19<sup>th</sup> century homes designed by well-known Victorian-era architect George Barber.

Located between I-40 and Magnolia Avenue in East Knoxville, the Parkridge neighborhood has one of the largest if not the largest concentration of George Barber houses in Knoxville.

The Saturday afternoon tour is being planned in conjunction with the city's Centennial Conservation Expo to be held on the same day in Chilhowee Park. The daylong fair will commemorate the National Conservation Exposition of 1913, also held in Chilhowee Park, and will celebrate 100 years of conservation efforts in Knoxville and East Tennessee.

The Expo will include historical displays, photographs and films, hands-on demonstrations and exhibits, circus performers and other children's activities, live music and other live entertainment, athletic competitions, multimedia presentations and events throughout the grounds of Chilhowee Park.

### **2. Got Conflict? Call the Community Mediation Center!**

Whether you have a seemingly endless problem with your neighbor's barking dog, an unresolved boundary dispute, or a problem with a nuisance property, there is a resource in Knoxville that can help if you are unable to resolve a neighbor-to-neighbor conflict yourself.

Founded as a non-profit organization in downtown Knoxville in 1994, the Community Mediation Center helps resolve neighborhood conflicts through the use of trained volunteers. Using a facilitated six-step process, co-mediators meet with the parties to work out a fair and acceptable agreement.

To learn more about the Center --- as well as some simple conflict resolution skills --- you can have the Community Mediation Center present a program at your next neighborhood meeting. Also, the Center is looking for eager volunteers to be trained to mediate for their

### **3. KPD Encourages Groups to Participate in National Night Out**

The Knoxville Police Department's Education Unit is encouraging neighborhood groups to participate in the 29th Annual National Night Out on Tuesday, October 1, 2013.

Community events on National Night Out provide an opportunity for neighbors to meet one another, increase interaction and communication among citizens and the police, encourage citizens to become involved in fighting crime, and allow citizens to recognize and celebrate the successes they have achieved through cooperative efforts.

### **4. City Seeks Comments on Report of Expenditure of Federal Funds**

A draft of the City of Knoxville's Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) will be available for citizen review and comment for a period of 15 days beginning Monday, Sept. 9. All comments must be received no later than September 23, 2013.

The report describes how the City of Knoxville utilized Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnerships Act, and Emergency Shelter Grant funding received from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development during the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2013.

## **5. Early Voting Begins; League Seeks Questions for Candidates**

Early voting has begun in the Fall 2013 elections for five seats on City Council.

Registered voters may vote through September 19, and the Primary Election is set for Tuesday, September 24. Meanwhile, the Voter Services Committee of the League of Women Voters is seeking ideas for questions that will be posed to candidates who make it through the September 24 Primary and who will be listed on the ballot for the November 5 General Election. Questions and candidate responses will be contained in a voter guide that the League will distribute prior to a citywide candidate forum that will be held at Cansler Family YMCA on Monday, October 14.

Five incumbent members of City Council are up for reelection this year to additional four-year terms of office. They are:

Nick Pavlis, District 1, South Knoxville and UT/Fort Sanders  
Duane Grieve, District 2, West Knoxville  
Brenda Palmer, District 3, Northwest Knoxville  
Nick Della Volpe, District 4, Northeast Knoxville  
Daniel Brown, District 6, Central and East Knoxville

Nick Della Volpe has drawn an opponent in District 4 --- Rick Staples. And Pete Drew is running against Daniel Brown in District 6. Council members Pavlis, Grieve and Palmer are unopposed.

Under the city charter, voters in the Primary will be able to vote only on the candidate or candidates running in their particular City Council districts. The top two vote getters in each district go on the General Election ballot. Everyone in the city then gets to vote in all Council races in the General Election.

## **6. KAT Announces Service Improvements**

Knoxville Area Transit (KAT) has recently implemented a number of service improvements, including more frequent service on many routes, a new pass option, and two brand-new routes. A new ad campaign introduces these new services and shows how KAT's passengers use their commutes.

The service improvements include the following:

\*\* During peak commuting hours, buses run every 15 minutes on Kingston Pike, Broadway and Magnolia.

\*\* On weekdays, bus frequencies have increased to run every 30 minutes on Chapman Highway, Central Avenue, Sutherland Avenue and Dandridge Avenue.

\*\* More frequent service in the evenings and on Saturdays makes it easy to go downtown on KAT for dining and entertainment.

\*\* A new 20-ride pass means not worrying with cash when commuting.

The video walks you through the step-by-step process, from planning your trip and paying your fare all the way to exiting the bus.
