

## Expanded emphasis on multi-modal transportation



- Hired an Alternative Transportation Engineer
- Replaced more than 21,000 linear feet of existing sidewalk and added 2,000 feet
- Installed 455 ADA sidewalk ramps
- Constructed 1.7 miles of new bike lanes
- Added the North Knoxville bike route

# Focus on Traffic Calming

- City is conducting a review of its traffic calming policy
- Surveyed peer cities in the Southeast
- Conducted a satisfaction survey of Knoxville residents
- Created a traffic calming website
- Held 5 public meetings last fall
- Over 140 citizens participated
- Policy review is ongoing
- Next Steps

## First Ring Neighborhood Focus - Commercial Façade improvement program

- Focused on Magnolia Avenue Warehouse District in 2013
- Supported redevelopment and reinvestment
- Forgivable loans, up to \$50K per building, require 20% contribution
- Projects create jobs, improve vacant commercial buildings and increase property tax revenues
- Completed 67 façade projects on 96 buildings, since 2006; creating 284 jobs



# Community Development – Implementation

## Coordination with KCDC and Redevelopment Areas



- Administer the \$800,000 annual contract with KCDC to revitalize 5 Points and Walter P. Taylor Homes
- Two six-plex buildings were completed in 2013, adjacent to Paul Hogue Park
- 102 replacement units are now complete (85 at the Residences at Eastport)
- KCDC just released WPT master plan for redevelopment

## Neighborhood Stabilization through Owner Occupied Rehabilitation Program

- Provide low-cost loans for properties to meet current building codes
- Includes energy efficiency enhancements
- If too costly to repair, replacement homes have been built
- New homes meet Energy Star ratings and visitability standards

- Completed draft of Homelessness Plan and posted for public comment
- Office of Neighborhoods launched an 11 week training program Building Strong Neighborhood Organizations
- Completed the three year regional planning process, PlanET - final plan will be available April 2014



Initiated a department-wide reorganization designed to improve accountability, customer service and improve production.

Started the architectural design work for the new \$16M Public Works Complex with construction slated to start in late 2014.

Will expand the Curbside Recycling Program to 2700 wait-list customer and add single stream recycling services to City parks in the spring of 2014.

Hired Urban Forester Kasey Krouse and created a new Urban Forestry Division.

## Operations: providing quality services to city customers

- Core services include household garbage & recycling, brush & leaf collection, street cleaning and maintenance of public infrastructure including greenways & parks.
- Collected and recycled 34,592 tons of organic yard waste (leaves and brush).
- Recycled 7,535 tons of aluminum, glass and other materials through our drop center, curbside and the new downtown recycling program.
- Swept and cleaned over 25,000 miles of City streets.
- Responded to multiple snow and ice events spreading salt on 1600+ miles of City streets and using over 53,000 gallons of pre-treatment brine.

## Nighborhood Codes: protecting neighborhoods and supporting investment



- Transitioned from a reactive to proactive enforcement model – 65% of all inspections are generated internally.
- Utilized the first Demolition by Neglect Ordinance implementation on Historic South High School.
- Inspected 1235 buildings and demolished 69 blighted & dangerous structures in neighborhoods.
- Inspected 17,237 dirty & overgrown lots.
- Addressed 712 abandoned or inoperable vehicles in neighborhoods.

## Urban Forestry – Protecting and Expanding Knoxville’s Tree Assets

- Implemented an expanded public tree inventory for use in future resource management.
- Implemented a cyclical tree maintenance program adopting a proactive vs reactive approach to tree care.
- Established the new Urban Forestry Division by reorganizing existing resources.
- Planted over 450 trees and overhauled our tree planting contracts.



# Focus on AVL's

## Using technology to improve efficiency & service

- Department wide implementation of an **automatic vehicle locator (AVL)** system for use in systems analysis such as collection routes, production & employee accountability.
- In 2014 the PSD will implement a **new work order and asset management software system** for use in tracking work order processes, crew production and management of City assets.

**City Snow Plan**  
Here are the latest numbers regarding overnight efforts by the City's Public Service Department: 1,240 tons of salt and 5,000 gallons of calcium chloride spread. Crews between 2-6 a.m. re-applied salt and calcium chloride to Level 1 and 2 streets. Priorities in the City's snow removal plan are these main roads, plus responding to emergency calls and supporting EMS, police, firefighter and hospital operations. Public Service Director David Brace's advice today: Secondary roads remain slick or snow-covered, so if you don't need to go out, stay safe and don't take risks.



We are pleased to announce that recently the Purchasing Division added to the Self-Service Vendor Registration Account the ability to classify a business as Veteran-Owned or Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned.
