# **Robust Go Vote! Knoxville Public Meetings Connect Candidates and Voters**

This summer, Mayor Rogero and members of City Council took Go Vote! Knoxville on the road.

As part of the nonpartisan civic-

engagement

initiative, public meetings were held in each of the five City Council districts where voters this year will be electing a new representative.

A sixth and final meeting will be held on Thursday, Sept. 7, in the 5th District, at the Christenberry Community Center, 931 Oglewood Ave.

and 6th districts featured the 30 candidates vying for the five open seats in those districts. The 5th District Council seat is not on the ballot this year, so the Sept. 7 meeting will feature the




10 primary election winners, who will be running citywide in the Nov. 7 general election.

The team entered a burning apartment and pulled two unresponsive residents to safety. "It's no coincidence that our firefighters seem to always be in the right place, at the right

time," Mayor Madeline Rogero said. "They immediately know what to do, and they do it skillfully, even if it means putting themselves in danger to help a stranger. That says a lot about the quality of their training, but even more importantly, it

speaks volumes about their courage and their character."

# 10 Questions with April Jones

You'll usually find April Jones sitting at the big, brown horseshoe desk in the Mayor's Office, answering calls from Knoxville's concerned citizens.

Always friendly and helpful, April has worked for the City for 15 years.

A 2000 graduate of Fulton High School, Jones' first job in 2001 was with Parks and Recreation. Soon, she was hired as an Assistant Recreation

Program Specialist. She moved to the Mayor's Office under Bill Haslam, and she's been here ever since.

The Knoxville native and mother of three says she'll be going back to Pellissippi State Community College this fall.

"I've always wanted to finish school not only for me but also for my children," she says. "It's hard to express to my children the importance of going to college with me not finishing it myself; I want to set an example."

The heartbeat of the office is usually near her desk. Whether it's Kevin Perry launching a quick dialogue, or a citizen walking in and needing directions, or Paige Travis erupting into a boisterous laugh at one of her jokes, April's radiant personality invites people to share a few minutes with her.

"I really enjoy my job and enjoy building relationships with co-workers," April says. "My job allows me to stay in contact with different departments within the City of Knoxville, which allows me to learn a lot about the City's operations, but thankfully everyone is always extremely nice and helpful when I call with questions or citizens' concerns/complaints."

### 1. How did you start working for the City?

When I started, it wasn't anything permanent. I was 19, looking for something to do while in school. I started out in Parks and Rec, helping out in the administrative office. It just went on from there; I applied whenever a job became available. From that first job, I've been here for the past 15-16 years.

# 2. What's your role in the Mayor's office?

I am an Administrative Assistant in the Mayor's Office. I sit in the front to greet guests and

answer the phone when people call in.

# 3. How did you become the Mayor's Office Administrative Assistant?

I actually started working in the Mayor's Office under Gov. Haslam's administration. When Mrs. Jean James retired, I took over her role.

# 4. How do you handle difficult callers?

It's kind of disappointing when you get the angry callers and you're not able to help them, but it's just part of the job. You just try to still be kind and help them as much as possible.

# 5. I understand your mother also works for the City. How did that influence you to work here?

I actually started before her, so you could say I influenced her. I think I was here a couple of years before she started working in Parks and Rec. But it's been awesome having my mom working for the City. We're really close.

# 6. What would you consider the most interesting part of the job?

The most interesting part of my job has been working under three mayors.

# 7. School starts back soon. Have any of your children made plans for tackling the new school year?

Right now, we're tackling summer projects; summer programs are winding down right now. My oldest daughter plays basketball for Fulton, so we've been doing a lot of summer practicing. She's worked hard this summer.

# 8. What do you like to do in your time off?

I like to read and also travel. I've been on a couple of vacations this summer. Traveling has been real big this year.

# 9. How were your vacations?

I got to go to Las Vegas and Miami this year. Vegas was the more busy vacation with all the sightseeing, but Miami was definitely the more relaxing, lying on the beach. I gambled \$40 in Vegas and lost \$40 and called it quits. I would say I enjoyed Miami more because I was able to relax.

# Summer Safety Tips from Risk Management

With temperatures soaring, be sure to protect yourself from the sun and heat:

- Schedule outdoor activities carefully, taking advantage of cooler morning and evening hours. UV rays are strongest and most harmful midday.
- Combination sunscreen/insect repellent products should be avoided, because the sunscreen needs to be reapplied every two hours, but insect repellent should not be reapplied that often.
- Never leave infants, children or pets in a parked car, even if the windows are cracked open.
- Unprotected skin can be damaged by the sun's UV rays in as little as 15 minutes.

- Clouds do not block UV rays, they filter them and sometimes only slightly.
- Cover windows. Use drapes, shades, awnings, or louvers for any windows that receive morning or afternoon sun. This can reduce the heat entering your home by up to 80 percent.
- Look for sunscreens that say "broad spectrum" or "UVA/UVB protection" on their labels these products work best.
- Don't use scented soaps, perfumes or hair sprays on your child; these odors attract insects.

Remember: Everyone is a risk manager!

The Knoxville-Knox County League of Women Voters offered a civics quiz. Parks and Recreation staff offered games so that parents could attend with their children.




The City sprung for the pizza, while local businesses donated the deserts – cupcakes, cookies and honey bun cake.

demonstration of grassroots, neighborhood-level democracy put into action," Mayor Rogero said. "Thoughtful, widespread community engagement leads to better local government. The Go Vote! Knoxville meetings promoted meaningful dialogue between candidates and voters, and made voters aware of the election cycle."





This year's elections are crucial, the Mayor and current Council members said, because the new members of the next Council will comprise a majority.

So it's important that city stakeholders get engaged in the election process, get to know the candidates, make informed choices on who they wish to support, and then go vote.

Early voting begins on Aug. 9.
