Fireworks & Fun for Festival on the Fourth



Long before most people have started making summer plans, the City of Knoxville's Special Events department is already working on its biggest festival of the year.

Festival on the Fourth brings together numerous City departments, contractors and community partners for a family celebration on World's Fair Park.

Knoxville has long celebrated Independence Day, writes Jack Neely for the Knoxville History Project. Back before Tennessee was even a state, city leaders marked the date that the founders of our nation signed the Declaration of Independence.

In recent times, the City of Knoxville has hosted a public gathering and fireworks show since 1984, first at Chilhowee Park and then at World's Fair Park. What began as a simple invitation to bring your own chair to listen to the Knoxville Symphony Orchestra and enjoy fireworks has grown into a full-fledged festival that takes up the entire park and lasts from 4 to 10 p.m. And admission is still free.

If you haven't been to Festival on the Fourth in recent years, you'll find it's grown in size, scope and entertainment value. The event boasts a variety of all-ages activities leading up to the big music and fireworks show.

Beginning at 4 p.m., guests are invited to enjoy activities and musical entertainment on the North Lawn. The Temper Evans Band will kick off the shindig, followed by Airlifter Brass, a brass guintet of the United States Air Force Band of Mid-America Air, at 6:15 p.m.

"We're excited to have Airlifter Brass performing this year," said City of Knoxville Special Events Director Judith Foltz. "They're known for their versatility and outstanding musicianship." The quintet will preview their full Festival on the Fourth set with a free performance July 1, 5 p.m. on Market Square.

10 Questions with Kristi Tunstall

She's the new Administrative Technician in Plans Review and Inspections, and she's quickly learning the ropes.

But ask anyone in the office, and they'll tell you that teamwork and strong technical support from co-workers like Kristi Tunstall are essential in efficiently managing the department's growing workload.

Plans Review and Inspections completes about 30,000 codes inspections a year. Last year, total valuation of all building projects reviewed exceeded \$424 million. Inspections were up by about 20 percent over the previous year, and the number of plans reviewed and permits issued also increased by 20 percent.

That's a lot to wrangle with.

Meet Kristi Tunstall, Plans Review and Inspections' newest employee.

1. As Plans Review and Inspections' Administrative Technician, you handle a lot of details. Any surprises in your first two months on the job?

I'm not sure there have been surprises, but there are a lot of moving parts and new people to become familiar with. I am enjoying learning how things work.

2. You've had a lot of work experience, managing logistics and personnel. What single experience best prepared you for working in Plans Review & Inspections?

For much of the last 10+ years, I have worked in an operations support role in the Department of Energy arena. Perhaps not a single experience, but the fact that business moved so quickly and I needed to respond in kind, helped me to learn to juggle many tasks simultaneously and efficiently. This also taught me to work with many different personality types.

3. How can you help the department function more efficiently? Can you share an example?

A new perspective could result in small changes that can save time. I want to learn "how it's done" currently before I make suggestions for change. There is value in knowing how things work before you take them apart.

4. Congratulations on your son's graduation from Farragut High School! Tell us a little about your family.

Thank you. We are so proud of our son! My husband and I have been married for 22 years and we have two boys. Next school year, we will have two freshmen: one in high school and one in college. We are not from the area originally, but have lived in Knoxville since 2000.

5. And your brother competed in the 2012 Olympics as a pole vaulter? What was it like, watching the Olympics up close in London?

I am very proud of my brother. Watching the Olympics on TV has always been something that I enjoyed. Seeing the whole event firsthand (not just the part the camera focuses on) as well as watching my brother compete is something I'll never forget. Having an opportunity to walk through Olympic Village to see the different venues and the athletes from all over the world was certainly humbling. It is amazing how a city can be transformed to host an event of that magnitude.

6. We understand your sons are athletes as well. Do you spend a lot of time, traveling to baseball games or hauling golf clubs to tournaments?

Both of my boys have played baseball since they were 4 or 5 years old, starting in a recreational league, then moving on to travel ball and school teams. My younger son transitioned to golf last summer and is enjoying playing a different sport. These activities take a lot of time and truly are a family commitment, but I really enjoy it and we have met some great people in the process. What more can a mom ask than to watch her children participating in something they love?

7. A few years ago, your family took in spring training baseball in Arizona. You hiked in the desert and saw cairns and cacti. What was the best memory from that trip?

Also stationed on the North Lawn are nine holes of miniature golf, Lego tables from Bricks for Kids, and opportunities to soak fellow revelers in a game of Water Wars. Little ones can jump to their hearts' content in the bounce houses located in the Tennessee Amphitheater. And the popular paddleboats return to World's Fair Park's pond.



Festival on the Fourth Fun

One of the best parts of July 4th is the food, and several on-site vendors will offer hot dogs, barbecue, corn (both kettle and roasted), ice cream, funnel cakes and more.

Once you're full of treats and ready to sit a spell, plop your chair down on the South Performance Lawn and enjoy live bluegrass from Stoney Point Bluegrass Band, starting at 5:30 p.m.

At 8 p.m., Knoxville Symphony Orchestra Music Director Aram Demirjian takes up the baton for the KSO's 33rd Annual Free Pilot Flying J Independence Day Concert.

"Aram's first introduction to Knoxville was conducting the Independence Day concert last summer, so this feels like a milestone," says KSO Communications Director Rachel Dellinger. "He programs the show as a musical celebration of America."

Popular patriotic tunes include "The Star Spangled Banner," the Armed Forces Salute, John Phillip Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever," plus KSO will perform Aaron Copland's "Hoe-Down," which you may recall from the "Beef: It's What's for Dinner" campaign. The program also includes an homage to revered American composer John

Williams, who wrote the film scores to *Star Wars*, *Raiders of the Lost Ark*, *Saving Private Ryan* and many other iconic movies.

Knoxville folk duo Blond Bones will join the KSO to play a few of their own songs and pitch in with the orchestra. Another special guest is Knoxville Poet Laureate RB Morris, who will perform an original narration for Williams' piece "Hymn to the Fallen" from Saving Private Ryan.

The Williams tribute is a teaser for the Symphony's 2017-18 season, which in January will feature "Raiders of the Lost Ark: Film Plus Orchestra," which finds Steven Spielberg's 1981 film projected on the big screen at the Tennessee Theatre and accompanied by the KSO performing the epic score.

"Music is a great way to celebrate and honor our country and its distinguished musical heritage," Dellinger said. "The symphony is thrilled to perform this free concert for East Tennessee audiences."

World-famous LaFollette-based Pyro Shows will launch a bigger-than-ever 15-minute fireworks display at 9:35 p.m. The show will be broadcast live on WBIR Channel 10 and streamed live on WBIR.com from approximately 8-10 p.m.

No matter which way you experience it, Festival on the Fourth is a special Knoxville tradition that commemorates our country's founding and what makes our community such a extraordinary place to live.

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS FROM RISK MANAGEMENT

It's finally summertime – and Risk Management offers these seasonal safety tips:

- Protect your hearing when operating machinery, including lawn mowers. If you have to raise your voice to talk to someone who is an arm's length away, the noise can be potentially harmful to your hearing.
- · Never swim alone.
- Actively supervise children in or around water. Drownings are the leading cause of injury/ death for young children ages 1 to 4, and three children die every day as a result of drowning.
- Don't go in the water unless you know how to swim; swim lessons are available for all ages.
- Don't dive in unfamiliar areas.
- Enter the water feet-first. Enter head-first only when the area is clearly marked for diving and has no obstructions.
- Don't underestimate the power of water; even rivers and lakes can have undertows.
- Watch the face especially the eyes. Many victims don't call, wave or signal for help because they can't keep their head or arms above water.
- Children under 6 months should not have sun exposure!
- Establish water rules for your family and enforce them without fail.
- If you go boating, wear a life jacket! Most boating fatalities occur from drowning.
- Avoid alcohol in or around the water!
- Know how and when to call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number in the event of an emergency. Teach young children your address.

Remember: Everyone is a risk manager!
