#6 - 1629 North Hills Blvd.

A classic Minimal Traditional with Colonial Revival influence built in 1939, this one-story brick veneer has six-over-six double-hung windows and a central unroofed stoop with entablature and pilasters.



#7 - 1615 North Hills Blvd.

This Spanish Eclectic one-story stucco Bungalow, built in 1930, has a gable roof with lower cross gables and a hip-raised section over the rounded front porch. It has the original terra cotta tile roof and eight casement windows, tripled on front elevation with arched transoms.




#8 - 2600 Whittle Springs Rd.

Knoxville Fire Station #11 was built in 1931 after Knoxville switched from horse-drawn steam pumpers to motorized fire trucks. It still has the original fire pole, though it is not used today. The station's captain lived in a prominent North Hills house, which stayed in his family until 1981. This station is one of the city's busiest, so firefighters may have to respond to a call during the tour.

#9 - 2241 Washington Pike

Washington Pike United Methodist Church was designed by well-known architect Charles Barber and built in 1927. Award-winning Philadelphia architect Harold Wagoner designed an enlarged sanctuary, which was constructed in 1960. Later in 1977, the church installed a magnificent Moller pipe organ.



#1 - 1726 North Hills Blvd.

Built in 1929, this Minimal Traditional with Queen Anne influence is a one-story frame stucco with a cross gable roof, octagonal side turret and a fanlight transom. It was the home of the teenaged Patricia Neal, best known for winning the 1963 Academy Award for Best Actress. She also sponsored the local Patricia Neal Rehabilitation Center after recovering from a debilitating stroke.



#2 - 2930 Fountain Park Blvd.

This English Cottage Revival, built in 1940, is a one-story frame with brick veneer. It has a distinctive steep side gable roof with multiple front gables.



#3 - 2950 Fountain Park Blvd.

This two-story stucco is another English Cottage Revival, built in 1930. It features an especially steep-pitched front gable roof and a one-bay gable entry portico.



#4 - 3008 Fountain Park Blvd.

Constructed in 1928, this two-story stucco Bungalow has strong Spanish Eclectic influences. In 1999 the owners added a matching walled side patio, which is often mistaken as part of the original structure!



#5 - 3051 Kenilworth Lane.

One of the largest houses in North Hills, this stately Colonial was built in the neighborhood's Woodland Terrace addition for a prominent Knoxville family in 1934. It features elegant and spacious rooms with an abundance of windows throughout.
