### 1. City Offices Closed for Good Friday

City of Knoxville offices will be closed on Friday, March 29, for the Good Friday holiday. That includes the Office of Neighborhood Empowerment.

Waste Connections will run its normal residential garbage and recycling routes on that day. Downtown trash and recyclables will also be collected as usual

The City's five recycling drop-off centers will be open on Friday, but the Goodwill attendant will only be available to receive donations of household goods until 1 p.m.

The City's Solid Waste Facility, 1033 Elm St., will be closed on Friday, March 29, and Saturday, March 30.

As a reminder: Thanksgiving and Christmas are the only days of the year when residential curbside trash and recycling are not picked up as scheduled.

#### 2. Edgewood Park and Fairmont Emoriland Plan Garage Sale

The Edgewood Park Neighborhood Association and Fairmont Emoriland Neighborhood Association are planning a joint neighborhood garage sale for Saturday, March 30, starting at 8 a.m.

The boundaries for these two neighborhoods are Broadway to the west, Washington Pike to the south, Whittle Springs to the east, and a portion of Emoriland to the north. Here is a <u>map</u> of the participating homes.

Kennedy Grill food truck will set up at the corner of Acker St. and Ocoee St. from 11a.m.-2 p.m. for people to buy lunch and sit in the gazebo or in Edgewood Park.

KKB fulfills this mission through litter cleanups, environmental stewardship education to children and adults, murals, and plantings.

# 5. KPD Holds Central District Commander Forum Tonight

Central District neighbors are invited to <u>Knoxville Police Department</u>'s Central District Commander Forum on Tuesday, March 26, from 6-7 p.m., at Christ Chapel, 1538 Highland Ave.

The Central District is made up of South Knoxville, Downtown, **Historic Fort Sanders Neighborhood Society**, and a portion of **Old North Knoxville**, **Inc.** 

The goal of the forum is to meet with community members and discuss current crime and ongoing issues within the Central District and what the department is doing to resolve those issues.

Central District Commander Sammy Shaffer and his support staff will be there to speak with residents regarding their public safety concerns and what they can do to address them.

### 6. Housing and Neighborhood Development Requests Input

The City of Knoxville's <u>Housing and Neighborhood Development</u> is drafting its Program Year 2024 (Year Five) Annual Action Plan (AAP) update to its 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan.

The AAP describes the proposed use of U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment

Partnerships (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding for programs beginning July 1, 2024. The Plan will allocate funds across four priority areas: Affordable Housing; Homelessness; Creating Economic Opportunity; and Neighborhood Stabilization and Revitalization.

The Draft AAP will be available for a 30-day public comment period beginning on Thursday, March 28, at <u>KnoxvilleTN.gov/Development</u> under the "Reports and Plans" tab. One can also view the Draft Plan at the City's Housing and Neighborhood Development Department office at 400 Main St., Suite 532B, between 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. You can also contact Linda Rust at 865-215-2357 to request a copy.

The City is also hosting a public hearing on the Draft Annual Action Plan on Tuesday, April 23, at 5:30 p.m., at the City's Public Works Service Center, 3131 Morris Ave.

All residents are encouraged to participate. If you are unable to attend the meeting, your feedback is still appreciated.

Residents can ask questions or comment on the Draft AAP by emailing Linda Rust, Community Development Administrator, at <u>lrust@knoxvilletn.gov</u>, or by mail to P.O. Box 1631, Knoxville, TN 37901. The City of Knoxville Housing and Neighborhood Development Department will accept comments through Friday, April 26.

### 8. Last Chance to Sign Up: Summer in the City Interns

The deadline to apply for the Summer in the City Intern Program is Sunday, March 31, at 11:59 p.m. To apply online, please visit the City's <u>website</u>.

The City of Knoxville's Summer in the City Intern Program is a paid eight-week summer internship for ages 16-22 years to work 30 hours per week with a pay rate of \$15/hour.

Interns will be placed in City departments and assigned various administrative and support tasks, while also participating in weekly personal and professional development sessions on topics such as civic education, economic mobility, mental health, communication, and social justice. The weekly commitment for interns will be 30 hours per week, which also includes participating in a group community service project.

Each intern will be assigned to a department with a mentor in that department. The mentor will orient the intern to the department, train them on responsibilities, oversee their work, and meet with the intern on a weekly basis to provide instructional feedback.

Each intern must provide their own transportation to and from their worksite.

The weekly schedule for interns will generally be:

- Monday-Thursday from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. department placement
- Friday Professional and Personal Development various locations including City County Building and Public Works Building
- Daily lunch break at 12 p.m.

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## 10. What is a Champion Tree?

A Champion Tree is a designation given to selected trees that are special or superlative because of their height, size, and/or significance.

Do you believe you have seen the biggest oak, maple, tulip poplar or any other tree in your yard or community? Or do you know where one is located? Now is your chance to nominate it for recognition.

Nominations are now open for the biggest state tree through the Tennessee Champion Tree Program. This program is provided by the School of Natural Resource in the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture (UT). All you have to do is fill out the form on <u>UT's website</u>. Someone will contact you and then come out and measure the tree. Nominations are open until Wednesday, May 1. So go outside and look up!

In the mid-1970's, Tennessee launched its Champion Tree Program with the intention of identifying and cataloguing the largest native trees in Tennessee.

There are hundreds of state Champion Trees that cover the state of Tennessee. <u>View</u> the most current list of the champion trees by species.

### 11. What is Land Stewardship?

Land stewardship is the conservation of your property's natural resources and features over a long period.

Land Stewardship groups are beginning to take root in Knoxville's neighborhoods. Would you be interested in uniting in supportive neighborhood groups focused on restoring your neighborhood into a natural, wild, life-sustaining place?

The essence of a land stewardship group in your neighborhood might differ from others, but groups will generally share a common ethic.

The local Land Stewardship Coalition's neighborhood land stewardship ethic is rooted in the belief that community engagement, education, and ecosystem restoration can cultivate a profound connection between residents and the natural living world around them. The group is committed to supporting other groups in safeguarding and improving the relationships of our neighborhood's ecosystem. This commitment involves the implementation of strategic approaches and best practices aimed at fostering both ecological and cultural systems conducive to sustained ecological health and aesthetic beauty.

## 12. This is Good Friday

Those who celebrate Good Friday may indulge in service to others or carry out charities, which is considered a selfless act of kindness and love for others.

Many times the devotion runs from 12-3 p.m. to symbolize the time the Jesus hung on the cross. This is called 'The Three Hours' Devotion'. This devotion usually includes meditations on the Seven Last Words that Jesus spoke, which are actually phrases.

If you are of the Christian faith, you may want to check with your local church to find activities for you and your family.
