1. Mechanicsville Plans 8th Annual Homecoming

Mechanicsville Community Association is moving forward with plans to stage its eighth annual "Homecoming Celebratory Event" and community fair from 10 a.m. until dusk on Saturday, September 14, in Danny Mayfield Park.

The theme this year is "Working Together To Build a Stronger Community, One Neighbor at a Time."

For the second year, there will be a parade starting at 10 a.m. at the corner of East Fifth and University Avenues and ending at the park. The homecoming fair itself begins at 11 a.m. The fair will include crafts and food vendors, prizes, games, music, and a sharing of old and new visions for the community. 2. Apply Now for Neighborhood Leadership Training

The Office of Neighborhoods is taking applications for a neighborhood leadership training program that will be offered for the first time this fall.

The program was created specifically for participants in and leaders of resident-led, residentcontrolled neighborhood groups, as well as individuals who would like to start neighborhood associations in unorganized neighborhoods.

"Building Strong Neighborhood Organizations" (BSNO) is designed to address a wide variety of questions and concerns about starting and sustaining an effective neighborhood organization. Topics include: styles of leadership, identifying and utilizing a neighborhood's most important asset, how to facilitate effective meetings, recruiting and retaining members, internal and external communications, decision-making and conflict resolution, and strategic planning.

This first edition of the BSNO program is being offered jointly with "Healthy Kids, Healthy Communities," a program of the Knox County Health Department.

There will be one session per week on Thursday evenings, beginning September 5 and running through November 14, at the health department on Dameron Avenue. Each of the 11

sessions will be two hours long, and a light meal will be provided. There is no fee, but participants will be strongly encouraged to attend every session except for personal or family illness.

The highly participatory sessions will be facilitated by a veteran community organizer, Bill Murrah, a key player in the early days of the Fourth & Gill Neighborhood Organization and a current board member of the group. Murrah's entire career has been devoted to helping nonprofit community organizations increase their effectiveness.

Participants will receive a textbook, "Building Powerful Community Organizations," along with a 3-ring binder of numerous "how-to" articles on various aspects of creating and sustaining community-based organizations.

The BSNO curriculum was developed with the assistance of a curriculum committee that included Bill Murrah; Mary Thom Adams, a past president of Town Hall East; Terrell Patrick, president of Cold Springs Watch; Mickeeya Harrison, member of the Neighborhood Advisory Council; Linda Rust, president of South Haven Neighborhood Association; and Donna Hottinger, past president of Westwood Homeowners Association, along with Office of Neighborhoods staff.

3. City to Review Policy on Traffic Calming

The City of Knoxville this fall will take a fresh look at the way it responds to citizen concerns about speeding in residential neighborhoods.

As part of this review of its traffic calming policy, the city's Engineering Department and Office of Neighborhoods have scheduled five public meetings to hear citizens' views on the best ways to control speeding on residential streets.

The meetings will be held during September and October in different parts of town so that all interested citizens have a chance to participate. Each meeting will include the same introductory information and opportunity for public input. See details below.

Citizens' ideas, suggestions, concerns and opinions will also be gathered via a traffic calming web site that will be launched by early September. The site will include a list of various types of physical traffic calming devices (such as speed humps), links to numerous traffic calming resources across the World Wide Web, and a survey of traffic calming policies of peer cities in the region.

"Speeding on residential streets is among the top issues identified in every survey of concerns in Knoxville's neighborhoods," noted David Massey, neighborhood coordinator. "Due to limited resources, it is also one of the most challenging problems for any municipality to address. But we felt it was time to take another look to make sure we are doing everything we can to grapple with this persistent problem."

Utilizing the public input, budget constraints and other factors, city staff will formulate a draft policy and publish it for citizen review and a follow-up public meeting in the first quarter of 2014. Members of City Council will also be asked to weigh in before a final policy is presented for City Council's endorsement. It is anticipated that implementation of the new policy would begin during the second quarter of next year.

Currently the city's traffic calming measures include police surveillance and ticketing of speeders on eligible streets on a rotating basis throughout the year, lowering of the residential speed limit from 30 mph to 25 mph in some cases, and installation of new speed limit signs and rumble strips at the entrance to neighborhoods. Any city neighborhood organization or Knoxville resident can call 311 to request a review of a particular street for consideration of these measures.

Beyond these measures, citizens often ask for speed humps and other physical traffic calming devices. For a variety of reasons, the city discontinued installation of physical devices several years ago. Whether to resume the use of physical devices is one of the key questions to be addressed in the policy review.
