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1. Parkridge Street Fair to Celebrate Summer Solstice

Parkridge Community Organization will celebrate the longest day of the year with a street fair from 5-9 p.m. Saturday, June 21, at the corner of East Fifth Avenue and Olive Street, which also happens to be the location of the Parkridge Community Garden.

One block of Olive Street will be closed off for a community potluck supper; children's activities; and live Americana, bluegrass and gospel music. The community-building event will also showcase the raised beds, water retention system and composting bins in the community garden.

Meanwhile, PCO has changed the day of its regularly scheduled monthly meeting. The group will now gather on the first Monday of each month but at the same time (6:30 p.m.) and at the same place (Cansler YMCA). Next Meeting: Monday, July 7.

2. Lyons View Community to Dedicate Pavilion

The Lyons View Community Club will dedicate a pavilion on Saturday, July 5, to honor the memory of community member William "Sonny" E. Davis, Jr.

A dedication ceremony will take place shortly after 11 a.m. to honor Davis "as well as others who have contributed so greatly to the foundation and growth of this community," noted Davis's son, Ronald D. Davis, Sr., who spearheaded the construction of the pavilion.

A cook-out will follow the ceremony. Friends of Lyons View are invited; please bring a covered dish to share.

Due to very limited parking at the community center, all attenders are asked to park at the Church of the Ascension, 800 Northshore Drive. A shuttle will transport you the short distance to the site.

3. Town Hall East Elects New Officers, Board Members

Eston Williams has been elected president of Town Hall East, succeeding Mac Goodwin, who remains on the board for one year as past president.

Dr. Judy Roy was elected to a second term as vice-president, and Desiree Folger was named treasurer. The new secretary is Sharon Davis, who in the past has served as president of the neighborhood organization.

Elected to three-year terms were Rick Mallory, Doug Toppenberg, and Beverly Calhoun. Other new board members are Millie Ward and Manya Whitney-Miller, who were appointed to fill unexpired terms. Other current board members are Tyler Roy, Shelley Mangold, Brenda Brooks and Jeff Petrik, as well as Mac Goodwin.

Outgoing board members are Elizabeth Peterson, Josh Inwood and Deb Haines. Sharon Davis expressed appreciation for the service of outgoing board members, but singled out Haines who "served faithfully and energetically for 10-plus years as director, vice-president and secretary."

5. City Service Ending for Tina Belge, Natalie Crone

For more than 10 months, Tina Belge and Natalie Crone have worked in the city's Community Development Department and Office of Neighborhoods, observed how the sausage is made in city government, volunteered at EarthFest and other eco-friendly events, participated in numerous neighborhood meetings, contributed to the success of this year's Neighborhood Awards & Networking Luncheon, answered the phone, run errands, solved problems, and contributed to this newsletter.

Along the way, as members of AmeriCorps, they have each developed a new program that enhances the services offered by the Office of Neighborhoods. And now, all too soon, their service is coming to an end.

During the last year, Tina developed a new "Fight the Blight" workshop and follow-up program for neighborhood groups interested in working more closely with the city on combating blighted properties in their communities.

For Tina, the experience cemented her attraction to a career in local government. "I have worked at the federal and state levels of government," she notes, "but nothing beats the local level of government and working directly with people in the community to solve problems

together and show them what services the city can provide them to enhance their lives. There is something special about local government, and I can see myself working in this field the rest of my career."

Indeed, before moving on to graduate school in public administration, Tina has signed up for another AmeriCorps year. Starting in August, after getting married to her longtime beau, she will work for the Greenville County, S.C., Redevelopment Authority as program head of their Emergency Home Repair program for low-income elderly and disabled citizens.

During her AmeriCorps year in Knoxville, Natalie biked all over town to work closely with neighborhood groups and a wide variety of emergency services to refine and fine-tune the Neighborhood Disaster Preparedness Program, which she will pass on to her successor for implementation.

"The largest lesson I have taken away from my service is how powerful a group of committed individuals is," Natalie observed. "Government can facilitate and incentivize change, but true progress takes hold from the actions of individuals. Working with the Office of Neighborhoods ingrained in me the "rise up" approach to change, which focuses on empowering individuals, as opposed to the conventional "top down" approach to progress which focuses on building institutions."

From Knoxville, Natalie is headed to Rehovot, Israel, where she will work with Israel Teaching Fellows, serving as a teacher, community organizer and volunteer. She then hopes to attend American University to work toward her Master's Degree in International Service.

6. Be Proactive: Sign Up for Alerts

Knox County has implemented a new community-wide notification system that offers email, text, and phone alerts in case of an emergency.

Residents can choose to receive community-wide emergency alerts, public safety alerts, and/or weather alerts. Utilizing E911 Center data, Rural Metro will issue the alerts as well as provide the necessary action instructions, such as "take shelter" or "evacuate".

There is no fee to participate in the potentially life-saving program.

7. CAC Taking Applications for Community Leadership Class

8. Agencies Seek Public Input on Greenways Connection in West Knox

The <u>Great Smoky Mountains Regional Greenway Council</u> and <u>Knoxville Regional</u> <u>Transportation Planning Organization</u> (TPO) are seeking public input on their plan to link West Knoxville and Knox County to Oak Ridge via greenway trails.

The first public meeting for the plan will take place from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 26, at Pellissippi State Community College, in the Cafeteria Annex, located inside the J.L. Goins Administration Building.

The TPO and Greenways Council hope to identify routes for linking three greenway segments:

- the 10 Mile Creek Greenway in West Knoxville and West Knox County
- the Pellissippi Greenway in West Knox County
- the Melton Lake Greenway in Oak Ridge

Public input is essential for making Greenways an effective transportation tool.

Light refreshments will be provided, and all are welcome to attend. Following the meeting, there will be a walk along the Greenway trail at Pellissippi State. Guests are advised to wear comfortable shoes if you plan to go on the walk.

9. Citizens Can Testify on Blighted Properties

Here are the properties on the agenda for the next Public Officer Hearing at 9:30 a.m. Friday, June 27, in the Small Assembly Room of the City County Building.

The properties that have been approved to be heard for repair/demolition orders are: 4113 Alma, 223 Atlantic Avenue (including accessory structure), 3960 West Bellemeade Avenue (including accessory structure), 1900 Bernhurst Drive (including accessory structure), 1935 Dandridge Avenue, 307 South Elmwood Street, 1019 Ford Place, 321 Hiawassee Avenue, 507 Hickory Drive (including accessory structure), 7716 Luxmore Drive (including pool), 711 East Oldham Avenue, 110 Pelham Road, 3848 Skyline Drive a/k/a 3852 Skyline Drive, 4313 Strolling Drive, 704 Washburn Road, and 3906 Whedbee Drive.

Properties on the agenda for boarding confirmation are: 3504 Argyle Drive, 223 Atlantic Avenue, 2904 Brock Avenue, 307 South Elmwood Street, and 3310 Forestdale Avenue. These are vacant buildings that were secured and boarded by the city because they were accessible and an attractive nuisance.

At this meeting, the Public Officer --- David Brace, director of the Public Service Department --- will hear testimony on buildings that inspectors contend are in violation of the city's building codes. Testimony can also be made by the property owners, neighbors, neighborhood groups, and other stakeholders, such as lien holders.

The Public Officer then decides whether to issue an order requiring that the violations be addressed in a certain period of time. Failure by the owner to cure the problem may result in the boarding or demolition of a structure, or the cleanup of a dirty or overgrown lot, with costs billed to the owner. A property owner may appeal the Public Officer's decision to the Better Building Board and, ultimately, to Chancery Court.

If any of these properties are in your neighborhood, consider attending the meeting to submit testimony about the impact of the property on the neighborhood.
