Fourth & Gill Neighborhood Organization's ARToberfest --- a celebration of Art, Musik, Brats and Bier --- will be held from 2-9 p.m. this coming Saturday, Oct. 24, on Morgan St. between Third Ave. and Gratz St. near Central United Methodist Church.

Of the profits, 40% goes to public art, 40% for neighborhood maintenance and beautification, 10% to ARTreach (a non-profit that provides creative opportunities to youth), and 10% to the neighborhood with the greatest attendance.

5. Play in the Street This Weekend

Bring out the kid in yourself this weekend and play in the street, literally, along a onemile stretch of North Central Street between the Old City and Happy Holler.

The City of Knoxville --- in collaboration with <u>Bike Walk Knoxville</u> and the <u>Knoxville</u> Regional Bicycle Program --- will close that section of North Central to motorized vehicles from 1-4 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 25, for Knoxville's first Open Streets event.

People of all ages and abilities are invited to walk, scoot, skip, ride bicycles, hula hoop, play croquet, and try out activities like yoga and Zumba and pickle ball --- all in a setting that is traffic-free.

There will be bike rentals, demonstrations of the popular Indian sports Kabbadi and Kho and Kho, frisbee golf, musical chairs, glass blowing, dance demonstrations and performances, cake walks, dogs from rescue organizations, hard-court bike polo, a bike

rodeo, Tai Chi demonstrations, Bus Riding 101 (how to put your bike on a city KAT bus), a photo booth, One World Circus, Dragonfly Aerial Arts....well, you get the idea.

All of it is free except for food, which will be provided by local food trucks and restaurants along the route.

Buying local fresh fruits and vegetables, especially local produce, was cost prohibitive for many people on the Tennessee Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) --- until now.

The farmers markets at Market Square and New Harvest Park are partnering with the AARP Foundation to help those on SNAP take advantage of a new Fre\$h Savings program. When a SNAP client buys up to \$10 worth of SNAP-eligible purchases at these farmers markets, he or she receives up to \$10 credit to buy fresh fruits and vegetables.

This program will be running at both farmers markets through the end of the season (end of December) and for three full years after this. The Market Square Farmers Market is open Wednesdays 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and Saturdays 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. The New Harvest Park Farmers Market is open Thursdays from 3-6 p.m.

SNAP clients should visit the Information booth at either market to receive tokens to be used for purchases throughout the market. For more information, contact David Vandergriff, UT Extension Knox County, at 215-2340.
