1. City Unveils Draft Plan for Neighborhood Traffic Safety

The City of Knoxville has released the draft Program Guide for a new Neighborhood Traffic Safety Program (NTSP) and is looking for public comment on the proposed program, which is expected to launch this coming summer.

An online survey is available, and two public meetings have been scheduled later this month.

Developed jointly by the Engineering Department, Police Department and Office of Neighborhoods, the NTSP is a comprehensive approach to neighborhood concerns about speeding. For qualifying neighborhoods, the program will include enforcement, education and/or the use of a wide range of traffic calming measures, including but not limited to speed humps and traffic circles.

Neighborhood leaders and others concerned about speeding are asked to study these PDF documents and then provide comments in one of several ways during the rest of May.

City staff will review all public comments and consider changes and additions to the draft program wherever possible. A launch date is tentatively anticipated during the month of July. The City will not accept applications until the program is officially launched. Updates can be checked on this web page.

2. Marble City Residents Organize Themselves

About 20 residents in the Marble City area off Sutherland Avenue met at a neighborhood church recently and voted to organize themselves into the **Marble City Neighborhood Organization**.

They elected a five-person leadership team --- Josh Burnett, Randy Gehrts, Kameron Hanshaw, Jay Price and Lee Ann Walker --- to operate the group over the next six months, thus giving themselves ample time to determine how they will handle officer elections and related issues.

They decided that the neighborhood boundaries, at least for now, will run from Sutherland north to the freeway, and from Liberty Street west to Third Creek. And they set the date and time for the next meeting: 11 a.m. Saturday, June 25.

Knoxville Police Officer R.L. Britt was present to field concerns about crime, drugs, speeding traffic and other issues. Neighborhood resident Matt Dean spoke briefly about his efforts to establish a community garden in the neighborhood with the help of his employer, the Emerald Youth Foundation

Finally, the group finalized plans for a cleanup and picnic in the neighborhood this coming Saturday, May 7. Residents will meet at Grove Heights Baptist Church on Knott Avenue and have plans for five teams of volunteers: litter pickup, chainsaw, bulky waste, Third Creek cleanup and community garden build.

Congratulations to these residents and particularly to Jay Price, who has been organizing cleanups for the last several years, participating in citywide neighborhood events, and looking forward to the day his neighborhood would have its own organization.

3. Cruise with RiverHill to Raise Funds for Sculpture

The **RiverHill Gateway Neighborhood Association** is planning to embark on a fundraising cruise in mid-May, and all are invited to participate.

The two-hour cruise on the <u>Volunteer Princess</u> will begin at Volunteer Landing Marina at 6 p.m. Monday, May 16. This will occur rain or shine as the boat is "fully climate controlled." A taco bar is included in the \$29.95 ticket price, \$5 of which goes to RiverHill's fundraising drive for a sculpture that it plans to commission and erect on city property at the corner of East Hill Avenue and Volunteer Landing Lane.

City Council recently voted to accept the organization's donation of the sculpture. Called "ki-net-ik," the stainless steel artwork will be created in stages by local artist Derek White and will depict fishing, boating and other scenes on the waterfront.

4. Neighborhood Leaders to Hear About Community Schools

Three staff members of the Great Schools Partnership (GSP) will speak at the next meeting of the Neighborhood Advisory Council (NAC) starting at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 11, at the Cansler YMCA, 616 Jessamine Street.

Stephanie Welch, vice president of operations and newly appointed interim president; Mark Benson, the community schools field supervisor; and Adams Fritts, the site coordinator at Dogwood Elementary School, will provide an overview of GSP, explain the purpose of Community Schools, and suggest ways that neighborhoods can get involved.

Welch was named interim president following Buzz Thomas's appointment as interim superintendent of Knox County Schools. Meanwhile, West View Elementary and New Hope Elementary schools have been added to the list of community schools.

5. Fifteen Groups Selected for Neighborhood Small Grants

Fifteen neighborhood organizations have been selected to receive support from the City of Knoxville's Neighborhood Small Grants Program.

The groups requested funding for neighborhood improvement projects that also build community and strengthen the capacity of the organizations to better serve their communities.

The grants --- totaling \$34,525 --- are contingent upon approval by Knoxville City Council, which will vote on the awards at its May 10 meeting.

The Office of Neighborhoods announced the availability of the funds last December, held pre-application workshops in January, and then accepted applications in March.

An independent, volunteer, eight-person evaluation committee of Knoxville citizens conducted site visits to the applicant organizations and then met to advise the Office of Neighborhoods on which applications should receive funding, in what amount, and with what conditions or guidance. The Office of Neighborhoods was able to accept all of the panel's recommendations.

Under a city contract, the <u>East Tennessee Community Design Center</u> will serve as fiscal sponsor for 10 of the 15 grantees.

The Office of Neighborhoods will monitor the progress of the funded projects, provide technical assistance as needed, and encourage an exchange of ideas and best practices among grant recipients.

6. Community Organizer to Address League of Women Voters

Mike Hodge, a community organizer from Nashville, will be the guest speaker at the League of Women Voters Annual Dinner on Thursday, May 19, and the public is invited to attend.

Hodge is the lead organizer for NOAH --- Nashville Organized for Action and Hope --- an organization that helps unify people from different backgrounds throughout Nashville. He has been serving the city for 34 years and will be sharing his knowledge at this dinner. Topics will include creating neighborhood organizations, better jobs, more affordable housing, and changing the criminal justice system.

The dinner will take place at the Foundry, 747 World's Fair Park Dr., starting at 5:30 p.m. for social hour, 7 p.m. for Mike Hodge and 7:30 p.m. for the Membership Meeting. All are welcome. 7. Rogero Names Vaughn for PARC

Mayor Madeline Rogero has named Clarence L. Vaughn III as the new Executive Director of the Police Advisory and Review Committee (<u>PARC</u>), which reviews citizen complaints and Internal Affairs reports involving the Knoxville Police Department.

Vaughn, who has an MBA from Syracuse University in Organizational Management and a B.S. in Business Administration from Florida A&M, has worked in banking and business consulting since 2007. He has volunteered with a range of community organizations, including the Helen Ross McNabb Center, Knoxville Botanical Gardens and Arboretum, Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Commission, and Knoxville Area Urban League Young Professionals.

Mayor Rogero said Vaughn stood out because of his knowledge of civilian oversight; his experience working with and advocating for community groups and individuals; and his investigative experience gained from serving in various positions within the banking industry. He will begin his position with PARC on Monday, May 9.

8. Two Houses Are Certified Blighted by the BBB

The City of Knoxville's Better Building Board last week voted to certify 507 Hickory Drive and 3738 Speedway Circle as blighted under the City's Chronic Problem Properties ordinance.

Owned by Ronald S. Conway, the Hickory Drive property is located off Clinton Highway in northwest Knoxville. It was found unfit for human habitation in 2010, and the house

was demolished after that. The lot itself was first "determined" blighted by the BBB last December.

The Speedway Circle house is still standing and is owned by Angela Fields. Eligible for an H-1 historic overlay, the house was originally located in downtown Knoxville and then moved to Speedway Circle many years ago. The zoning is R-1, and there are numerous interior, exterior and structural violations.

A property first determined and then later certified to be blighted can eventually be acquired by the City, using its eminent domain powers, if the owner fails to take corrective action or if negotiations to purchase the house are unsuccessful.

Houses thus acquired are then listed for sale in the Homemaker's Program (see story below). The Community Development Department has charge of both the Homemaker's and Chronic Problem Properties programs.

9. House Added for Sale in Homemaker's Program

The City of Knoxville has recently listed another home for sale in the Community Development Department's Homemaker's Program.

The home is located at 5620 Sierra Road in the Tower Heights community off of Central Avenue Pike. Acquired through Community Development's Chronic Problem Properties program, the 1,836-square-foot, R1-zoned house features three bedrooms, one bath, living room, dining room, kitchen, and den/family room. It will require extensive rehab including but not limited to the roof, gutters, electrical wiring, plumbing, HVAC, flooring, kitchen and bathroom upgrades, etc.

Under the Homemaker's Program, the City offers vacant lots and lots with substandard structures for sale to individuals, non-profit organizations and businesses. These properties have been identified by the City for acquisition to further its mission to remove blight, redevelop neighborhoods and provide affordable housing opportunities. The purchaser will be required, in almost all cases, to construct a new dwelling on vacant parcels or rehabilitate existing structures.

Individuals can make an offer on a property by submitting an application. The sales agreement includes a provision that allows the City to take the property back if the new owner fails to make improvements to the property per guidelines.
