1. Town Hall East Elects Officers, Board Members

2. City to Hold Two Public Meetings on Traffic Calming

The City of Knoxville will hold two public meetings on May 12 and May 16 to receive public comment from neighborhood organizations and the general public about a newly proposed Neighborhood Traffic Safety Program (NTSP).

NTSP, which is expected to begin in mid-summer, is a comprehensive approach to concerns about speeding on neighborhood streets. The program will incorporate the Knoxville Police Department's existing program for enhanced speed enforcement; introduce a new, neighborhood-guided education program; and deploy traffic calming measures on streets that qualify for such measures.

Traffic calming measures include physical devices, including but not limited to speed humps and traffic circles, as well as roadway modifications.

Citizens concerned about speeding are asked to study these PDF documents and then provide comments in one of several ways during the rest of May.

City staff will review all public comments and consider changes and additions to the draft program wherever possible. A launch date is tentatively anticipated during the month of July. 3. City Council to Consider Annual Budget Tonight

Knoxville City Council this evening will consider, on first reading, an ordinance to adopt Mayor Madeline Rogero's proposed \$303 million budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

All budget documents, including the text of Mayor Rogero's "State of the City" address, can be found at www.knoxvilletn.gov/budget. One of the documents is the schedule for City Council's legislative budget hearing on Tuesday, May 17, when each department will explain its budget for the year. The second reading of the budget ordinance is tentatively scheduled for the May 24 Council meeting.

The budget includes \$200,000 for the new Neighborhood Traffic Safety Program (see article #2 above).

Also on tonight's agenda:

*** Second reading of an ordinance to regulate "mobile food units" (food trucks).

*** A resolution authorizing the Mayor to enter into contracts with 15 neighborhood organizations that are slated to receive financial support under the Neighborhood Small Grants Program.

*** First reading of an ordinance, recommended by the Metropolitan Planning Commission, to amend the zoning regulations to define "alternative financial services" (e.g. check cashing establishments), identify districts in which they are permitted, and establish standards for their location.

6. Free Tennessee Radon Testing Kit Available

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) is providing free kits for homeowners to test their homes for unsafe levels of radon.

Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas found in soil. Low levels are safe, but when the gas accumulates in a house with poor ventilation, it can be harmful and can even cause lung cancer after prolonged exposure. More information can be found [here](#).

7. Fight the Bite: Avoid Mosquito-borne Illnesses

The Knox County Health Department ([KCHD](#)) is urging area residents to do their part to prevent mosquito-borne illness.

Tennessee is home to many types of mosquitoes, including *Aedes aegypti* and *Aedes albopictus*, which are capable of transmitting several serious diseases.

At this time, mosquitoes in Tennessee are not transmitting Zika virus disease, which has been associated with birth defects. Mosquitoes here, however, are known carriers of other diseases seen each year in Tennessee, including West Nile virus and La Crosse encephalitis. They can also carry dengue fever, yellow fever and Chikungunya virus, although not currently in Tennessee.

“To prevent mosquito breeding spots, we urge residents and business owners to discard or tip over items that can unintentionally hold water,” said KCHD Director Dr. Martha Buchanan. “A mosquito can lay her eggs in something as small as a plastic coke bottle top, so tossing these types of items into the trash could help prevent you or someone else from suffering a mosquito bite.”

Most mosquitoes, says one state health official, rarely travel much farther than the length of two football fields, or a little more than 200 yards from where they are born. Thus a neighborhood effort to cover or remove items that hold water can reduce mosquitoes in the area. To prevent mosquito bites, officials recommend:

*** Wear long, loose and light-colored shirts and pants and wear socks. Tucking shirts in pants and tucking pants into socks will help form a barrier. Wear closed shoes or boots instead of sandals.

*** Treat clothing with permethrin or purchase pretreated permethrin clothing.

*** Avoid perfumes, colognes and products with fragrances that might attract mosquitoes.

*** Prevent mosquitoes from breeding in larger water-holding devices, including bird baths or garden pools: Use larvicides such as mosquito torpedoes or mosquito dunks. If used properly, larvicides will not harm birds or animals, KCHD says.

** Apply repellants to skin often.

Repellants can include lotions, liquids or sprays. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends the use of repellants which contain DEET, Picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane 3, 8-diol and IR3535. The duration of protection varies by repellant; read labels on products to determine when reapplications are

necessary for optimal protection. To learn more about insect repellants, visit <http://cfpub.epa.gov/oppref/insect/>.
