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### 1. Water Quality Forum Offers Grants

For the first time, <u>Water Quality Forum</u>, a consortium of local public and private groups working together to protect local waterways, is offering neighborhood groups a chance to apply for its Environmental Stewardship Grants Program.

But you have to act fast. Proposals are due Feb. 24.

The program provides modest funds (up to \$1,500) for the application of stormwater best management practices. These are "green infrastructure" projects that increase rain water infiltration and reduce runoff. Ideas can range from tree plantings to rain gardens.

## 2. Wiffle Ball Challenge Sparks Interest from Neighborhoods

The City of Knoxville's Parks & Recreation Department will host the tournament, which will be held on Saturday, June 10.

Interested neighborhoods should form teams of at least eight people --- but 12 are recommended. If you have enough players, you may have two teams from a single neighborhood. If you don't have enough, your players can join an independent team.

Teams are welcome to print jerseys or simply wear the same color shirt. Team colors will be assigned by Jennifer on a first-come, first-served basis. There will be no cost to participate.

If you have never heard of wiffle ball, or played it, that is okay. This is an opportunity to get together with neighbors, have fun, and get to know residents of other neighborhood groups. The number of neighborhoods wishing to participate will determine where the event is held.

## 4. Registration Opens for The Neighborhood Conference

Registration is now open for **The Neighborhood Conference** on Saturday, March 11, 2017, at the Knoxville Convention Center.

Everyone planning to attend --- residents, speakers, exhibitors, volunteers, public officials, and sponsors --- should register so that we can generate name tags and an accurate count for breakfast and lunch.

Because of the number of workshops (22) and information booths (80), neighborhood groups are encouraged to bring as many of their members as possible to absorb as much information as possible and take advantage of everything the conference has to offer.

This large biennial event --- 700 attended in 2015 --- is designed specifically for neighborhood organizations. This is a chance for you to meet residents of other neighborhoods, compare notes, and learn from one another. Even if you are not a member of a neighborhood group, you will still find plenty to do, much to learn, and many interesting people to meet.

There is no charge to participate. Doors will open at 7:30 a.m. for a free continental breakfast sponsored by <a href="Home Federal Bank">Home Federal Bank</a>. An opening general session will feature welcoming messages from Knoxville Mayor Madeline Rogero and Knox County Mayor Tim Burchett. Other features include:

- \*\*\* The free lunch is sponsored by Waste Connections and Hatcher-Hill Properties.
- \*\*\* Twenty workshops address crime prevention, HOA legal issues, blight, neighborhood revitalization, animal control, ways to save on your KUB bill, how to help neighbors in need, neighborhood events and projects, and much more!
- \*\*\* Two additional workshops are designed especially for youth interested in learning how to work with city government to get things done in their neighborhoods.
- \*\*\* Over 80 information booths from a variety of governmental agencies and nonprofit organization will be on hand. Some booth spaces are left. See article below.
- \*\*\* Take this opportunity to meet members of City Council as well as departmental staff members in both city and county governments.

\*\*\* A "Candidates Corner" will be set up on the Cumberland Concourse to give candidates for Knoxville City Council a designated place to meet voters and hand out campaign literature.

\*\*\* Free parking will be available at the UT Garage on Eleventh Street, the Locust Street Garage across from the YMCA, and the surface parking lot directly across Henley Street from the Convention Center.

## 9. City Offers Tips on Hassle-Free Garbage Pickup

The City's Public Service Department is asking that city residents take a few steps to make sure garbage is picked up each week with as few problems as possible.

Trash should be out by 7:00 a.m. on your pick-up day. City ordinance allows you to place the garbage cart at the curb the night before your pickup day if 7 a.m. is too early. Put garbage in the garbage cart and place it in the usual pick-up location with the wheels closest to the house.

Place the cart away from vehicles, utility poles or other items that might restrict the robotic arms from picking up the cart. Please do not allow the cart to block traffic, mail service, and sidewalks. Try to be aware of any other safety issues when you put your cart out.

Only contents of the cart will be picked up; lids must be closed with NO additional bags placed on top.

The City's bulky waste policy has not changed. See the <u>website</u> for details. Bulky waste is NOT additional bags of garbage that the cart was too full to hold.

If you have large volumes of garbage, the City is expanding its curbside recycling program to help manage waste volume. Recyclable materials can be diverted away from the landfill and reused, saving taxpayer money in disposal fees and extending the life of the landfill. Call 311 to sign up or go on line to register for a Recycle Cart.

# 12. BZA Decisions Can Impact Your Neighborhood

Six properties are on the agenda for next week's meeting of the Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA).

Established by city ordinance, BZA hears appeals of denials of building permits by the city's Building Inspections Department. The board, consisting of five citizens appointed by the Mayor, meets at 4 p.m. on the third Thursday of each month in the Small Assembly Room of the City County Building.

BZA meets next Thursday, Feb. 16. Addresses on the agenda include 3515 N. Broadway, 902 N. Central Street, 6645 Clinton Hwy, 2120 Cumberland Avenue, 2341 Jefferson Avenue, and 3428 Keith Avenue.

Keep up with how the BZA might impact your neighborhood. Watch for the black and white signs indicating that there is a pending decision on a particular piece of property. Most signs are for Metropolitan Planning Commission issues --- which are also important --- but signs with the word "variance" are BZA items.

The BZA agenda is posted on the city website. Browse to <a href="www.knoxvilletn.gov/boards">www.knoxvilletn.gov/boards</a> and click on Board of Zoning Appeals. The agenda is posted no later than the Monday prior to the BZA meeting each month.

A neighborhood group that keeps track of BZA will call the Plans Review & Inspections Department at 215-3669 to request and study the paperwork on a particular appeal, decide whether to take a position on the appeal, and then attend the BZA meeting to voice the group's support or objections. A group can also request a postponement to allow time to meet with the applicant.

Decisions of the BZA can be appealed within 15 days of the BZA decision to Knoxville City Council. Appeals of a City Council decision are made to Chancery Court within 60

days of a City Council decision related to BZA.
