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1. Oakwood Lincoln Park Elects Officers, Updates Bylaws

The **Oakwood Lincoln Park Neighborhood Association** (OLPNA), one of the oldest neighborhood organizations in Knoxville, elected new officers this week.

Molly Conaway was elected president, succeeding Bill Hutton. Deb Thomas was elected vice president, following Emma Cosigua. The new treasurer is Sabrina DeVault, succeeding Deb Thomas. Emily Ellis was elected secretary, succeeding Molly Conaway.

Newly elected board members are Kevin Webster, Mark Knight, Tiffany Davidson, Ben Conaway, David Trent, Kathy Seely and Michelle Ivester.

In addition, OLPNA amended its bylaws, giving the Board of Directors more flexibility to establish committees and teams. The new bylaws also better defined the terms and duties of the various officers and directors.

Also at the meeting, outgoing president Bill Hutton was presented with a watercolor painting of the Harvey Street house that he shares with his wife Susan Smathers.

3. It's Wiffle Ball Time in Tennessee!

The Parks & Recreation Department's inaugural **Neighborhood Wiffle Ball Tournament** is scheduled for Saturday, June 10, at <u>Victor Ashe Park</u>, 4901 Bradshaw Road.

Each neighborhood is invited to form a team of eight or more people (12 is recommended). If you do not have enough members in your neighborhood to participate, you may create a team of friends. Learn more about wiffle ball.

Teams must register by Friday, May 13. The tournament is co-ed, ages 12 and up, and free to play. Team colors are chosen on a first-come first-served basis. Once registration closes, playing times will be set.

There are six confirmed teams --- Burlington Residents Association, Forest Heights Homeowners Association, Island Home Park Neighborhood Association, Norwood Homeowners Association, Old North Knoxville, and Timbercrest Neighborhood Association. Five other neighborhood groups have expressed interest.

6. City Schedules Public Meeting on Annual Action Plan

The City of Knoxville's Community Development Department next week will hold a public meeting to receive public comment on the <u>2017 Draft Annual Action Plan</u> that describes the proposed use of federal funds beginning July 1.

The meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, May 8, at the John T. O'Connor Center, 611 Winona Street.

As noted in a previous newsletter, the draft plan was posted on April 10 for a 30-day public comment period. All comments must be received no later than May 9.

The funds are from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs for the third year of the city's Five Year Consolidated Plan.

Due to funding uncertainties in Washington, D.C., the draft plan does not contain funding levels. The final version of the Plan will contain actual amounts and is due to HUD 60 days after the date HUD's allocations are announced, or on August 16, 2017, whichever comes first.

The City of Knoxville encourages comment on the draft plan. Copies may be examined online at www.knoxvilletn.gov/development or in person at the Department of Community Development, 5th floor, City-County Bldg., 400 Main Street, and the main office of the Knoxville-Knox County Community Action Committee, 2247 Western Avenue. 7. Mayor Presents Budget for Next Fiscal Year

Mayor Madeline Rogero last week delivered her annual State of the City Address and introduced the high points of her proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Those high points include creation of a new affordable housing trust fund, a sharp increase in funding for sidewalks, a \$17.5 million capital investment to convert over 30,000 street lights to LED technology, and continued investments in Knoxville's Urban Wilderness.

Other proposed investments include The Change Center, the Magnolia Avenue Streetscapes Project, and infrastructure improvements to support the proposed Emerald Youth Foundation sports complex in Lonsdale.

As required by City Ordinance, the first reading of the budget will take place at the regular City Council meeting set for Tuesday, May 9. The second reading could come as early as May 23.

At the State of the City address, Knoxville Poet Laureate R.B. Morris delivered a poem he composed for the occasion. This can be found on the budget page as well.
