6. Board of Zoning Appeals Meets Next Week

Fourteen properties are on the agenda for next week's meeting of the Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA).

BZA meets next Thursday, Dec. 21, 4 p.m. at the Small Assembly Room of the City County Building.

Addresses on the agenda are 3804 Kenilworth Drive; 1524 Jefferson Avenue; 4214 Greenway Drive; 1955 Woodbine Avenue; 1700 N. Central Street; 3207 South Haven Road; 215 Bearden Place; 2039 Cherokee Boulevard; 911 Luttrell Street; 6751 Wilbanks Road; 3825, 3829, and 3831 Martin Mill Pike; and 6410 Chapman Highway.

Your neighborhood representative may choose to attend and voice the group's support or objections, if one of these properties is in your neighborhood or you have information to share with the board. The group can also request a postponement to allow time to meet with the applicant.

Established by city ordinance, BZA hears appeals of denials of building permits by the city's Building Inspections Department. The board, consisting of five citizens appointed by the Mayor, meets on the third Thursday of each month.
