1. No Newsletter Next Week, Office Closed March 26 and 30

This Neighborhood Advisory newsletter will not be published next week so that the Office of Neighborhoods can devote full attention to the last-minute details of The Neighborhood Conference on March 24.

In addition, the Office of Neighborhoods will be closed on Monday, March 26, and all City offices will be closed on Friday, March 30, for the Good Friday holiday.

2. Keep Knoxville Beautiful Hosts South Knoxville Clean Up

Keep Knoxville Beautiful (KKB) will host the second annual community-wide South Knoxville Cleanup from 9 a.m.–12 p.m. on Saturday, March 17. The event will kick off at Sam Duff Memorial Park, 4060 Chapman Highway.

The South Knoxville Community Cleanup was first hosted in March 2017, when South Knoxville was KKB's "Community of the Year." Over 300 people volunteered, making it KKB's largest volunteer event. This year, over 280 volunteers are expected to participate in the cleanup.

Participating community leaders from various South Knoxville neighborhoods will meet at the park, pick up supplies, and then disperse into their own neighborhoods to pick up litter. Individuals will clean the streets surrounding Duff Field.

Community groups participating include Wildlife Habitats of South Woodlawn, Boy Scout Troop 255, BSA Troop 36, South Doyle Neighborhood Association, South Haven Neighborhood Association, Colonial Village Neighborhood Association, Island Home Park Neighborhood Association, and Old Sevier Community Group.

Volunteers will reconvene at Sam Duff Park to get lunch and volunteer t-shirts provided by Smoke-Free Knoxville. For more information about KKB or this clean up, visit KKB's website.

3. Six Days Left to Register for Neighborhood Conference

Local hip hop and spoken word artist Black Atticus will perform at the Neighborhood Awards and Networking Luncheon at the Neighborhood Conference on Saturday, March 24.

This is a return engagement, and Black Atticus once again is composing a poem especially for neighborhoods and those who struggle to create community and a safe environment for all residents. Those who have heard him in the past know that this is a performance not to be missed.

6. New Door Prizes: Big Ears, LaFetta's, Regal Cinemas, Plaid Apron, Wild Eggs

The world-famous <u>Big Ears Festival</u> has donated two weekend passes for a door prize at the Neighborhood Conference.

Other newly added prizes include 10 movie passes from <u>Regal Cinemas</u> and gift certificates from <u>LaFetta's Soul Food Restaurant</u>, <u>The Plaid Apron</u>, and <u>Wild Eggs Knoxville</u>. The Plaid Apron and Wild Eggs gift certificates, \$50 each, were provided by a donor who prefers to remain anonymous.

7. Ride KAT for Free to the Conference

Anyone coming to the Neighborhood Conference on Saturday, March 24, can ride KAT for free. Just tell the driver you are going to the Neighborhood Conference.

Take the city bus from all parts of Knoxville to the Knoxville Station on Church Avenue. It is then an 8-minute, 0.4-mile walk to the Marriott.

Or you can hop on the Blue Line Trolley in front of Knoxville Station. The Blue Line will run two hours early just for the conference. From 7-9 a.m., the trolley will drive onto the Marriott property to unload conference guests at the front door. Just be sure to tell the trolley driver you want to go to the conference.

If you are taking Route 40 /South Knoxville, tell the driver you are going to the conference at the Marriott. The driver can let you off at Hill Avenue before Volunteer Landing. It is then just a 5-minute walk to the hotel.

8. Park for Free at the Neighborhood Conference

The 2018 Neighborhood Conference will be held at the Marriott Hotel, the uniquely shaped building at 501 East Hill Avenue next to the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

The City of Knoxville's Coliseum Parking Garage C should be the first choice for most conference participants. You can enter the garage on Honor Our Troops Drive (a two-way street) or Historic Preservation Drive (a one-way street). See the map.

After you park in Garage C, climb the stairs or take the elevator to the top level. You can then use the covered pedestrian bridge across James White Parkway to walk right into the Marriott front entrance. Easy as pie.

If you are driving to the conference and use a wheelchair or have difficulty walking, you can park on the west wide of the hotel and make your way to the west entrance. Or you

can drive past the front of the hotel and park in the hotel garage. In the garage, take the elevator to Level 2 for a short walk into the main lobby, where the conference registration desk will be located.

If you do not have mobility issues, please respect the needs of hotel guests and park in the Coliseum garage. Also, please do not park in the Hall of Fame lot. The facility will be in use that day by another group.

9. Conference Sponsors Provide Vital Support

Each year, the Office of Neighborhoods has a budget of \$18,000 to cover "miscellaneous meeting expenses" for its meetings, classes and seminars --- including the annual Neighborhood Conference.

This taxpayer-supported fund, however, is not enough to cover the full costs of the conference, a large event that typically draws 600-700 participants and offers a free lunch. Many conferences charge a fee to booth vendors, but we do not.

10. Scholarships Available to Attend Fair Housing Conference

The Equality Coalition for Housing Opportunities (<u>ECHO</u>) and the City of Knoxville, along with many partners, have scheduled the 2018 Fair Housing Conference for Friday, April 6, from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Foundry.

Beneath the banner of "Golden Reflections of Equality," the conference will commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Fair Housing Act, the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the PBS television show "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood."

Workshop topics included fair housing and tenant/landlord law, the difference between service animals and emotional support animals, and addiction and housing. An awards luncheon will honor community leaders and agencies for activism in civil rights.

11. League Plans First Three Candidate Forums

The League of Women Voters of Knoxville and Knox County, along with other partners, has scheduled three candidate forums in the current races for Knox County Sheriff and seats on the Knox County Board of Education.

Andre Canty, Dametraus Jaggers, and Evetty Satterfield are the candidates participating in the District 1 School Board Forum from 6:30-8 p.m. Thursday, March 22, at Pellissippi State Community College, Magnolia Branch, 1610 E Magnolia Ave. Mark Mellenger of WATE-TV will moderate.

Joyce Feld will moderate a Sheriff Candidate Forum from 7-8:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 27, at the City of Knoxville's Public Works Service Center, 3131 Morris Ave. Candidates Tom Spangler and Lee Tramel have agreed to participate.

A forum for the District 4, 6, 7 and 9 Board of Education districts will be held from 6-8 p.m. Thursday, March 29, at Fulton High School. Tearsa Smith of WATE-TV will moderate. The five candidates in those races --- Virginia Babb, Terry Hill, Patti Lou Bounds, Kristy Kristy, and Amber Rountree --- have been invited to participate.

<u>The Center for Urban Agriculture</u> (CUA), located at the <u>Knoxville Botanical Gardens</u>, 2743 Wimpole Ave., is offering seasonal or annual plot rentals so that individuals and families can grow some of their own food.

The plot rental includes use of one 4'x12' raised garden bed, seeds, access to community tools, and classes offered by CUA. A seasonal plot (May through September) costs \$15. An annual plot costs \$30.
