1. Montgomery Village Hosts Memorial Walk

The **Montgomery Village Residents Association** would like to invite all residents and Knoxville neighbors to join them for a memorial walk and candle light vigil.

Come out to the track behind the Montgomery Village Boys and Girls Club, at 6 p.m., on July 3, to join in celebration and memory of those lives lost to gun violence.

The memorial walk began to honor the life of the son of an active resident in the Montgomery Village community. Now, several years later, the community gathers to embrace both his life and the lives of those lost throughout the years.

Come out, walk, and join in memorial to celebrate life and uplift those who have lost their loved ones.

2. Disaster Loans Now Available for Those Impacted by Recent TN Flooding

Beginning, Tuesday, June 25, Gov. Bill Lee announced the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) will provide disaster loans for Tennessee communities affected by February's severe storms and flooding.

SBA Disaster Loan Program will cover the five most affected counties and 14 adjacent counties, including Knox County. Loans up to \$200,000 are available for homeowners to repair damaged or destroyed real estate. Additionally, homeowners and renters are eligible for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property.

Small businesses and most private non-profits are also eligible for Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help cover capital hardships caused by disaster.

For more information or to apply for a Disaster Loan, visit Knox County's Disaster Loan Outreach Center at Central High School, 5321 Jacksboro Pike, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on week days, or 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 29. The Disaster Loan Center will ONLY be open from Tuesday, June 25 to Tuesday, July 2.

To apply online, visit the SBA Disaster Loan <u>website</u>. All applications for physical property damage must be filed by Aug. 20, 2019. Economic Injury applications must be filed by Mar. 23, 2020.

3. Volunteers Needed for USA Cycling National Championships

4. Garbage Pick Up as Usual During Holiday Schedule But No OON Newsletter

The City of Knoxville, including the Office of Neighborhoods, will be closed Thursday, July 4, in observance of Independence Day. There will also be no newsletter published by the Office of Neighborhoods on Tuesday, July 2.

Waste Connections will run residential garbage and recycling routes on Thursday, July 4, per usual. Downtown trash and recycling will run on its regular schedule throughout the day as well.

The City's recycling centers will be open for recycling use; however, the Goodwill attendant will not be available for donations of household goods.

The City's Solid Waste Management Facility located at 1033 Elm Street will be closed on Thursday, July 4. Free for City Residents, Saturday at the Solid Waste Management Facility will be held as normal on the first Saturday of the month – including Saturday, July 6.

As a general reminder, Thanksgiving and Christmas are the only days of the year when residential curbside trash and recycling are NOT picked up as scheduled.

5. National Night Out Competition Approaching

National Night Out focuses on celebrating community-police relationships and neighborhood safety in the United States.

The national date of celebration is the first Tuesday in Aug., which will be Aug. 6; however, Knoxville celebrates the first Tuesday in Oct., which will be Oct. 1, this year. When you register with us, you will receive two yard signs to help guide people to your event.

Also new this year, the Office of Neighborhoods is instituting a new neighborhood contest for National Night Out. All neighborhoods are encouraged to participate in the National Night Out Contest, regardless of whether they celebrate in Aug. or Oct.

The contest features three winning categories:

- o Most interesting theme
- Most people
- Most creative activity

To win, your neighborhood must submit photos as evidence. Photos from camera phones and electronic devices are accepted.

Lastly, we will be asking neighborhoods to nominate their Officer Liaison's as the best in Knoxville, so begin thinking about a nomination. More on this to come in future newsletters.

6. Elections Are Around The Corner

Multiple elected official positions are up for election in 2019. The positions are: Mayor, City Councilmember At Large Seat A, City Councilmember At Large Seat B, City Councilmember At Large Seat C, City Councilmember District 5, and Municipal Judge.

City elections are non-partisan, which means candidates do not have to declare a party affiliation.

The primary election is Aug. 27, with early voting from Aug. 7-22. The last date to register to vote for the primary is July 29.

For the mayoral election, if no candidate gets 50% of the vote, the two candidates with the most votes advance to the general election on Nov. 5. In City Council races, the top two candidates advance to the general City-wide election, regardless of percentage of votes.

The general election is on Nov. 5, with early voting from Oct.16-31. The last day to register to vote is Oct. 7.

7. Tennessee to Ban Handheld Phones for Drivers Starting July 1

As a result of new state legislation, beginning July 1, all drivers will be prohibited from holding a phone with any part of their body while driving. If you wish to talk on your phone while driving, you will need to have a hands free system, ear piece, wrist piece, or other voice-controlled form of communication.

Drivers under 18 are already prohibited from using a handheld phone while driving. This new law will include persons over the age of 18, covering all adults. Any drivers caught holding their phones while driving will be fined \$200.

This new phone law, effective July 1, is one of hundreds of new state laws passed by the 111th Tennessee General Assembly.

Election season is underway, and there are numerous opportunities to get to know the City of Knoxville Mayoral and City Council candidates.

Currently there are six candidates on the ballot for City of Knoxville Mayor. On Tuesday, June 25, at 6:30 p.m., the League of Women Voters will host a candidate forum at the News Sentinel Building, 2332 News Sentinel Drive.

The forum, moderated by WATE's Blake Stevens, will offer questions and answers with all six candidates: Michael Andrews, Fletcher "Knoxville" Burkhardt, Indya Kincannon, Eddie Mannis, Calvin Taylor Skinner and Marshall Stair. Candidates will be available for interviews immediately following the forum.

This Mayoral Candidate Forum is co-sponsored by Centro Hispano, the Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta, Knoxville Chapter of the NAACP, the Greater Knoxville Chapter of the National Coalition of 100 Black Women, Knoxville Area Urban League Young Professionals and the Knoxville News Sentinel.
