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1. NAC to Discuss How to Recognize Neighborhood Orgs.

All are welcome to attend. NAC members will discuss the topic first and will take comments from the public, time permitting.

Best Practices for neighborhoods is an initiative to recognize neighborhood groups that do an exemplary job representing the needs of their community. The NAC has been working with the Office of Neighborhoods over the last couple of years to create a recognition program.

NAC members are appointed by the Mayor to:

- 1) Give advice and feedback on the programs and policies of the Office of Neighborhoods;
- 2) Bring neighborhood issues and concerns to the attention of the Mayor and City Administration;
- 3) Propose to the Administration responses and solutions to address these concerns; and

4) Serve as a sounding board for City initiatives and proposals affecting neighborhoods.

The NAC advises and provides input to the Mayor and City staff. As a matter of policy, it does not advise Knoxville City Council, Knoxville-Knox County Planning and other elected and appointed bodies; however, members may speak on behalf of their neighborhoods or as individuals.

7. Knoxville Celebrates Diverse Culture with New Mural

If you have taken a stroll through downtown this summer, you may have noticed some new public art. Transforming dark alleyways into vibrant pathways to explore, learn, and imagine, Knoxville's <u>Art in Public Places Mural Program</u> has encouraged art to spread through downtown, across the river, and out the corridors.

The newest and biggest undertaking yet, the Market Square Garage Mural, does not disappoint. Spanning 300 feet and three stories high, the new mural is a kaleidoscope of color depicting Knoxville's diverse culture with six unique faces of individuals who live here in the community.

Artist Addison Karl is a Settle-based muralist and counts the Market Square Garage Mural among his nearly 75 murals worldwide. However, despite coming from out of town, Karl has made a point to dedicate his project and his time here in Knoxville to being part of the community. Instructing a team of 9, including four local artists, Karl chose to photograph and paint the faces of people who live right here in Knoxville.

The Office of Neighborhoods took a field trip to see the mural and get our team picture. We were delighted to meet Karl, who took a moment out of his work day to speak with us. He emphasized his delight in spending time in our great city and being a part of the community.

The mural, in the clean, vibrant alleyway, brings the area to life. If you have a chance, come down to the east side of the Market Square Garage, between Wall and Union Aves., today, Tuesday, Aug. 6 at 4 p.m. for the reveal and celebration of the Market Square Garage Mural. Mayor Rogero, artist Addison Karl, Arts and Culture Alliance Executive Director Liza Zenni, and members of the Public Art Committee will be on hand to dedicate the mural and discuss its importance in our community.

Even if you cannot make it to this afternoon's reveal, make a point to wander down through the alley, adjacent to Market Square. Public art is a great way to brighten up a place, encourage positive recreation, and preserve culture.
