2. City Accepts Proposals for Historic Preservation Funding

The City of Knoxville is accepting proposals from owners of historic residential or commercial buildings within city limits, who are seeking funding for property improvement projects from the Historic Preservation Fund. The RFP for Funding for Improvements of Historic Buildings is available now at <u>City of Knoxville Current</u> <u>Solicitations | Vendor Registry</u>.

Applicants must own the property and present a deed of trust. Eligible properties must also be located within H-1 or NC-1 historic overlay districts, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic places.
