The Federal/State Primary, County General, and Town of Farragut Municipal Election is this Thursday, August 6.

- County Commission, Districts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9
- Assessor of Property
- County Law Director
- School Board, Districts 2, 3, 5, 8 (non-partisan)
- Town of Farragut Alderman, Ward 1 (non-partisan)
- Town of Farragut Alderman, Ward 2 (non-partisan)

Whether you are in search of food access, school supplies for your kids, housing assistance, KUB support, COVID-19 information, or more, 2-1-1 staff can get you connected to the right area resources and agencies to help with your concern.

With many looking for help on how to make ends meet, local, state, federal, and community agencies are working together to help support community needs. There is funding available through the CARES (Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security) Act for rental and housing assistance and small business support. KUB has social workers who can help you work through repayment plans to successfully pay off utility debt accrued over the last few months. Food pantries, soup kitchens, and non-profits

across the city are providing grab and go meals to help feed families through this time. The list of resources is long, and some options come with important steps, but 2-1-1 can help connect you with the right access.

If you, yourself, are not facing these struggles, but would like to support the Knoxville community through this difficult time, there are many ways to give back! United Way of Greater Knoxville is collecting funds to support the local non-profits providing essential resources throughout the area. Through the Knox County COVID-19 Response Fund, you can donate funds for United Way to allocate out to non-profit and community resources providing housing, food, utilities, and more. 5. Census Door-to-Door Efforts Cut Short

Due to rising concerns over the continued spread of COVID-19, the U.S. Census Bureau is cutting its critical door-to-door efforts short.

Attempts to conduct in-person census interviews will end on Sept. 30, instead of Oct. 31, as it was slated to do.

In an effort to overcome COVID-19 related setbacks, the deadline to mail in and complete census information online was extended. It is not too late to be counted! With the timeline for door-to-door effort cut short, make sure you get your household's data in as soon as you can!

6. Did You Receive Seeds In the Mail?

Stop and read this information before you do anything with seeds you did not order.

People are shopping online now more than ever before. For many people, it is common to receive a package and not pay attention to where it came from before opening it. However, many people are receiving unsolicited seeds in the mail. These mysterious seeds appear to be coming from China and could be an invasive species. If you receive mysterious seeds in the mail, do not plant them.

These seeds could also be a part of a brushing scam. According to the Better Business Bureau, brushing scams happen when an online seller sends something unsolicited, then writes glowing reviews about the product pretending to be customers. This is done to increase sales. If you receive these seeds you should keep them and the packaging they came in and contact local authorities.
