Neighborhood Advisory Council member, Morgan Wilson, wanted to find a way that she and her Parkridge neighbors could help Knoxvillians facing hunger during the pandemic.

Wilson looked into organizations feeding people in Knoxville and chose Second Harvest Food Bank of East Tennessee as the recipient of the neighbors' donations. Second Harvest's website allows users to set up challenges and goals to engage in friendly competitions for fundraising and providing meals to people in need. Wilson not only encouraged **Parkridge Community Organization's** neighbors to participate but turned it into a friendly competition for other neighborhood groups to participate in this virtual food drive.

As a result, 10 neighborhoods are participating in the food drive, and more than 41,000 meals have been raised for Second Harvest to distribute.

8. City Announces Holiday Schedule

City of Knoxville offices will be closed Thursday, Dec. 24, Friday, Dec. 25, and Friday, Jan. 1.

There will be no household garbage or recycling collection on Friday, Dec. 25, and Waste Connections' office will be closed. Friday routes will be picked up on Saturday, Dec. 26. Downtown commercial and residential collections will also resume on Saturday.

As a general reminder, Christmas and Thanksgiving are the only days of the year when curbside trash and recycling are NOT picked up as scheduled.

While Waste Connections will pick up garbage and recycling on Friday, Jan. 1, their office will be closed and telephones will not be answered.

Properly bagged excess holiday household trash and broken-down cardboard set next to full garbage carts will be picked up. Please remember to have garbage and recycling containers out for pickup before 7 a.m. on your normal pickup day.

For tips on how to prevent waste by recycling or donating gently used items during this giving season, please visit the City's recycling guide.

The City's five recycling centers will be open, but the Goodwill attendant will only be available for household goods donations for a half-day on Thursday, Dec. 24. The center will be unstaffed but open for recycling drop-off on Friday, Dec. 25 and Friday, Jan. 1.

The City's Solid Waste Facility, located at 1033 Elm Street, will be closed on Thursday, Dec. 24 through Saturday, Dec. 26, with normal hours resuming on Monday, Dec. 27. For the New Year's holiday, the Facility will be closed on Friday, Jan. 1 and Saturday, Jan. 2, with normal hours resuming Monday, Jan. 4.

Due to the holidays, "Free for City Residents Day" at the Solid Waste Facility will be held on Saturday, Jan. 9, the second Saturday of the month. This service is for City of Knoxville residents only—please no contractors and no shingles.

9. Mobile Meals Seeks Holiday Volunteers

Are you looking for a way to give back this holiday season? Consider volunteering for Mobile Meals!

The Knoxville-Knox County Community Action Committee's Mobile Meals Program is in need of volunteers to deliver meals to homebound seniors. Mobile Meals provides a hot meal and a wellness check to more than a thousand seniors age 60+, five days a week. With COVID-19 keeping more seniors at home, Mobile Meals has been serving more than 100 extra meals each day since this spring. However, the pandemic has also reduced the number of volunteers signing up to deliver.
