5. Mobility Plan 2045 Seeks Your Input

A <u>draft of the Mobility Plan</u> 2045, the region's long-range transportation plan that is updated every four years, is available for public feedback until Wednesday, April 7.

This update will guide transportation investments in the region for the next 25 years.

Last fall, local jurisdictions submitted their potential projects to be included in the plan, and then projects were selected and prioritized based on both technical analysis and public input. You can access all the proposed projects and information on <u>an interactive</u> <u>map</u>, where you can filter projects specific to your area and leave comments directly from the map.

To provide more information about the draft plan, and to give community members an opportunity to speak to staff about specific topics or projects, a series of virtual meetings has been scheduled throughout March.

Transportation Tuesdays will be hosted at noon for three Tuesdays in the month, each focusing on a different theme relating to the plan. There will also be two Virtual Town Hall events held at the end of the month. These will allow participants to move into breakout rooms organized by county to find out more about specific projects that are important to them. Finally, the regularly scheduled TPO Technical Committee and Executive Board Meetings will be open to the public.

7. National 3-1-1 Day Coming Up March 11

On Thursday, March 11 (3/11), the City of Knoxville's 311 Center for Service and Innovation will celebrate National 311 Day by educating the public on the importance of the City's phone number.

311 is the City's main resource hotline. 311 creates a one-stop shop for residents to report a pothole or blighted property on their street, request a sidewalk be repaired or created, request a building permit, check the schedule for trash or recycling pickup, and on and on. In 2020, 311 operators also stepped up to help field calls on the COVID-19 pandemic and the 2020 Census.

The East Tennessee area's 211 Social Services hotline is also housed in 311 Center for Service and Innovation, helping connect callers to much-needed social service needs, including rental and food assistance during the pandemic.

Air quality can have a major impact on Knoxville residents. In an effort to fight climate change and improve air quality, City Council in 2019 adopted a goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 80 percent by the year 2050. To help the City succeed in this effort, Mayor Kincannon launched a Mayor's Climate Council, a group of more than 65 local leaders and technical experts to identify climate strategies in the Knoxville area.

Alongside these efforts, the City wants to make sure we are working towards climate strategies that make sense for our community. The Office of Sustainability would like to hear your ideas and priorities!

Empower Knox is an initiative within the City's Community Empowerment department that works with area community groups to provide opportunities for young people to achieve in school, in work and in the community.
