6. KUB to Host Informational Meeting on Broadband Internet Plan

Knoxville Utilities Board (KUB) will hold an informational meeting about its proposed fiber and broadband plan on Monday, June 14, at 6 p.m. at the Change Center Knoxville, 203 Harriet Tubman Street.

The meeting is intended to provide the public with an additional opportunity to receive information about KUB's plan to provide broadband internet services to customers in its electric service territory.

Residents interested in attending the meeting can register at www.kub.org/broadband. During the meeting, KUB will provide a presentation about the plan and answer questions about the potential customer impacts and benefits.

7. Cicadas Scream Their Way into Summer

As you probably have heard by now, cicadas are back in East Tennessee this summer season. Periodical cicadas are a type of shield bug that spend around 13 to 17 years as

larvae (nymphs) underground before emerging above the surface to become adults and reproduce.

You can protect young trees or shrubs in your yard by covering them with mesh until cicada season is over. Appropriate coverings are any mesh covers that have holes ~1cm or smaller, available at local gardening stores. Although cicadas can be harmful to adolescent trees, they are beneficial to adult trees, acting as natural pruners, which means there will be less yard work for you.

Additionally, cicadas help bring air into the soil while their carcasses also add beneficial nitrogen. Nitrogen is a key natural element and fertilizer that helps wildlife grow. Adult cicadas have a short lifespan—only a few weeks. However, their long adolescences can be shortened by a variety of predators including humans. Be wary about how many chemicals you are putting on your lawn because it can cut a cicada's life short and also harm pets.

Additionally, if you are brave enough, cicadas are edible! There are many recipes online and first-hand accounts on what they taste like. You can make them into just about anything, like popcorn cicadas, cicada cookies, dumplings, pastas, and more. Although these insects can be loud, the pros outweigh the cons.

8. Affordable Housing, What Is The Need?

The United States is facing a shortage of affordable rental housing.

- Only 7.3 million affordable rental homes exist for the nation's 10.9 million extremely low-income (ELI) renter households.
- Not all of the 7.3 million homes are available approximately 3.3 million of these homes are occupied by higher-income households.
- Only 36 affordable and available rental homes exist for every 100 ELI renter households.
- Around 71% of of ELI renter households spend more than half of their income on housing, making them severely cost burdened.

The lowest-income households face enormous barriers in obtaining affordable and accessible housing. The increased stress from housing instability and lack of resources negatively affects low-income family members' mental and physical health.

Knoxville has lost hundreds of affordable units over the last few years, and, at the same time, market-rate rents have been steadily climbing.

The City has been taking sustained and consistent action to increase the availability of affordable housing, including the establishment of the Affordable Rental Development Fund (ARDF) in 2017 and the Affordable Housing Fund in 2021.

Since July 2017, the City has invested \$10.2 million in the creation of new affordable rental housing, leading to the completion of 547 units located in South, West, North and East Knoxville neighborhoods.

In an effort to increase the supply and long-term availability of rental housing options for persons with modest incomes, these funds have been created to bridge financing gaps that developers of quality affordable rental housing can face.
