Knoxville's Community Development Corporation (KCDC) is seeking community input from residents who live, work, visit or have an interest in the future of the Western Heights housing site and surrounding Beaumont neighborhood.

Community members can learn about KCDC's Transforming Western planning initiative and provide feedback on possible design options for buildings, parks and greenspaces,

and the overall site at an open house on Wednesday, June 16, 6-7:30 p.m. at the Western Heights Boys & Girls Club gym, 1417 W. Oldham Ave.

Transforming Western is a 15-month planning process for the future of Western Heights housing, neighborhood and people. The process engages residents and stakeholders and will culminate in KCDC applying in November for a \$30 million U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant to fund the transformation of the neighborhood.

### 5. The Benefits of Gardening

Home gardening offers a variety of benefits for the environment. It can also bring benefits to your home! When you plant a garden at home, or even grow just a few plants in a windowsill, you will save money.

By having access to fruits and vegetables right at your house, you will not have to spend the time and the gas it takes to go to the store. In addition, it is free to pick! One big added benefit is that you will produce less food waste. If you grow too much, you can always share with friends, neighbors and co-workers. If your food goes bad, you can compost it and put it right back into your garden. By composting and gardening, you are improving your soil quality for other things to grow.

One big benefit to gardening at home is the reduction of food miles. Food miles is the distance from production to consumption. This means that you will help reduce greenhouse gas emissions because your food is traveling from your garden to your home.

If you are not so fond of growing food, redoing your landscape to incorporate more native plant species is also a huge help. Local gardening centers can provide you with the tools and resources to renew your lawn. By incorporating native plants into your lawn, the plants are able to take carbon in, helping to sequester CO2 emissions. Thus, helping to reduce climate change. Additionally, native plants will thrive because of the ideal climate provided. This means they are easier to take care of and require less maintenance.

Native plants create a species richness that outsider plants cannot. This means that there will be more types of plants and animals in your area. A few native North American plants you might want to consider growing are Asters, Bee Balm, Sunburst, Sweet White Trillium, and Winterberry. These plants attract pollinators like bees and butterflies which are required to turn flowers into fruits and vegetables.

# 6. U.S. Cycling Road Races Impacts Neighborhoods this Weekend

Neighbors in downtown, South and East Knoxville can expect excitement and some road closures when U.S Cycling races are held this weekend. Neighborhoods closest to the action are Riverhill Neighborhood, Old Sevier, South Haven, Lindbergh Forest, Morningside Heights, Morningside, and Austin Homes.

On Friday, June 18, cyclists will ride a course downtown, closing portions of the following streets from 4-9:30 p.m. Gay Street at Cumberland Avenue, Hill Avenue to

Hall of Fame Drive, Church Avenue to State Street for one block, to Clinch Avenue for one block, then left onto Gay Street for two blocks to the finish line.

Vehicles parked inside the course will be unable to leave until the race ends. Drivers parked in the Dwight Kessel Garage will only be able to exit onto State Street after 4 p.m. And the ramp onto James White Parkway will be inaccessible from Main Street.

On Sunday, June 20 – which is Fathers' Day – the race starts on Gay Street, then heads to South and East Knoxville before finishing back downtown. Roads along the race route will be closed from 8 a.m. until about 7 p.m. Effected roads include: the Gay Street Bridge, Council Place, Atchley Street, Mimosa Avenue, Sherrod Road, Davenport Road, Cottrell Street and access James White Parkway at Anita Drive, Hill Avenue, Harriett Tubman Street, McCalla Avenue, Willow Avenue, Central Street, Clinch Avenue and Gay Street.
