5. Special Events Seeks Volunteers

The silver screen is coming back to Chilhowee Park this fall with Drive-In at the Midway! The City of Knoxville is pleased to collaborate with the Knox County Public Library to present four free, family-friendly movies on Fridays in October.

The City's Office of Special Events is in need of volunteers to help with parking the attendees. If you are available to help, they ask that you sign up with <u>Volunteer East</u> Tennessee.

6. Knoxville-Knox County Planning to Study a Section of Alcoa Highway

Knoxville-Knox County Planning staff will soon study a portion of Alcoa Highway and have planned two public meetings.

This study follows a design charrette held by the East Tennessee Community Design Center in 2019. In 2020, the City of Knoxville and Knox County each approved resolutions for Planning to undertake a study to develop an approach and policies to envision and manage development along the highway.

The final recommendations will look at land uses along the corridor, considering specific changes needed to spur that redevelopment and encourage retail, commercial and increased housing.

Both meetings -- one virtual and the other in person -- are on Thursday, Sept. 30. The virtual meeting is at 12 p.m. via Zoom. There will be a short presentation followed by time for questions. You may register by following this <u>link</u>.

The second meeting is at 5:30 p.m. at Sevier Heights Baptist Church North Campus, 2939 Alcoa Hwy. The meeting will start with a short presentation followed by an open house.

7. Early Voting Begins Mid-October

The early voting period for the 2021 City of Knoxville, City Council General Election begins Wednesday, Oct. 13, and runs through Thursday, Oct. 28.

City voters will elect five members to the nine-member City Council. Candidates are running for open seats in District 1, 2, 3, 4, and 6.

The City of Knoxville, General Election Day is on Tuesday, Nov. 2.
