#### 12. Be Safe – Drive Sober

According to the Tennessee Department of Safety & Homeland Security, between July 1, 2022, and June 30, 2023, 1 in 3 fatal crashes involved a DUI, and 1 in 7 serious injury crashes involved a DUI.

Driving under the influence (DUI) – also known as driving while intoxicated (DWI), drunk driving, or impaired driving – is the crime of driving a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol and/or drugs, including those prescribed by physicians.

In Tennessee, a drunk driver's level of intoxication is typically determined by the measurement of blood alcohol content (BAC). A BAC measurement of 0.08% defines the criminal offense.

Being convicted of DUI can impact your life in many ways, including loss of employment, prevention of employment in certain jobs, higher insurance rates, serious financial setbacks, personal and family embarrassment, and possible incarceration.

#### 14. How to Help Wildlife in a Heatwave

With this summer's high temperatures, it can be hard for people to stay cool and even harder for wildlife. Birds, insects, squirrels – all critters need to keep cool too. How can we help our wildlife friends during a heatwave?

National Wildlife Federation suggests:

- Keeping birdbaths full, and replace water at least once a week to prevent mosquitoes from breeding.
- Hanging a drip jug over your bird bath to keep the water fresh and moving.
- Putting out additional water in shallow containers, like saucers, to avoid creating a breeding area for mosquitoes, and replace the water regularly.
- Using generous amounts of mulch in the garden can help the insects, worms and smaller critters.
- Watering plants so that they can provide moisture for anything eating them (plus, the dew provides water for bees).
- Using natural hummingbird feeders.
- Capturing rainwater when you can and putting it out for wildlife to drink from.

Every effort to help our outside friends counts. Let's help everyone stay cool this August!

## 15. The Significance of August 8 in Tennessee

Generations of Black Knoxville residents and those across Tennessee have celebrated the Eighth of August as "Emancipation Day," the anniversary of Aug. 8, 1863, when Tennessee Military Governor Andrew Johnson freed people who were enslaved per the federal Emancipation Proclamation signed earlier that year.

Beck Cultural Center will host its Annual Eighth of August Jubilee Red Carpet event tonight, which includes a screening of the documentary "Emmett Till: White Lies, Black Death" at the Tennessee Theatre.
