## 4. City Council Holds Workshop on 'Missing Middle' Housing

City Council will hold a workshop on "missing middle" housing on Thursday, Sept. 28, at 5 p.m. in the Large Assembly Room of the City County Building, 400 Main St.

The City and Knoxville Knox County Planning have worked together to propose zoning changes that will ease the process of construction of a type of housing called "missing middle" because it's between single-family homes and large apartment complexes. This includes duplexes, triplexes, fourplexes and townhomes. Approximately 400 residents

# 6. Input on Consolidated Annual Performance & Evaluation Report Due Wednesday

The City's Office of Housing and Neighborhood Development will be accepting public input on a draft of its 2022-2023 Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) through tomorrow, Wednesday, Sept. 27.

The draft report outlines how the City spent federal HUD (Housing and Urban Development) funds between July 1, 2022, and June 30, 2023, on local activities that align with the Consolidated Plan: to reduce and prevent homelessness; stabilize and revitalize neighborhoods; and create economic opportunity.

The report is available for review online at <a href="www.knoxvilletn.gov/development">www.knoxvilletn.gov/development</a> and in person at the City's Housing and Neighborhood Development Office, Suite 532B (5th Floor City-County Building), 400 Main St.

The final report will be submitted to HUD by Saturday, Sept 30.

# 7. KPD Launches Faith and Blue

Between Oct. 6 and 9, the Knoxville Police Department (KPD) is participating in <u>Faith and Blue</u>, a national initiative launched in 2020 to facilitate safer, stronger, more just and unified communities by connecting law enforcement professionals, residents, businesses and community groups through the connections of local faith-based organizations.

The different KPD Field Operation districts are hosting events or initiatives. Additionally, the Investigations Bureau, Management Services Bureau and Professional Standards Bureau are taking part in the Faith & Blue events as well.

- The West District is collecting essentials, basic hygiene items, which will be donated to the Western Heights Baptist Center to support vulnerable, needy residents in the Western Heights area.
- The Central District is sponsoring a blessing of the department's K-9s on Friday, Oct. 6, at Immaculate Conception Church. In conjunction with that, they are collecting essential items to support the animals in the care of the Young-Williams Animal Center.
- The East District will host an ice cream social on Monday, Oct. 9, from 6-8 p.m. at the Christenberry Community Center on Oglewood Ave. The event was jointly organized by the KPD and the Alliance for Community Transformation
- KPD's Management Services and Professional Standards Bureaus are
  partnering to collect items to support the Isaiah 117 House, which temporarily
  houses children who are removed from their homes due to safety concerns.
  Specifically the Bureaus are collecting clothing items for teenage children.
  Items collected will be donated to Isaiah 117 House at their new location on Mill
  Road on Monday, October 9.
- Finally, the Investigations Bureau is partnering with Foster Chapel Baptist Church
  to support the Wesley House Community Center, which serves the
  Mechanicsville, Lonsdale and Beaumont communities. Food items will be
  collected for the Wesley House food pantry, which will culminate with an event at
  the Wesley House.
