1. Early Voting Starts Tomorrow!

Election Day in Knoxville is officially Tuesday, Nov. 7, but residents can vote early starting tomorrow, Wednesday, Oct. 18, through Thursday, Nov. 2.

All information about voting in Knox County--including polling locations, voting hours, and candidate lists--can be found at www.KnoxVotes.org. Voters who would like to request an absentee mail-in ballot need to do so at the above website by Tuesday, Oct. 31.

City of Knoxville elections are held in odd-numbered years. All terms of office are 4 years. After 2023, the next City election will be in 2025. Offices on the 2023 ballot are:

- City Council, District 5
- City Council At Large Seat A
- City Council At Large Seat B
- City Council At Large Seat C
- Municipal Judge

It is important to use your voice and cast your vote! See you at the polls!

2. Parkridge Hosts Home Tour

Parkridge will host their Home Tour on Sunday, Nov. 5, 12-6 p.m. beginning at 1520 Washington Ave. Tickets may be purchased in advance through <u>Eventbrite</u> for \$15. 4. City of Knoxville Holds Ribbon Cutting For Public Safety Complex

The City's new Public Safety Complex, located at 1650 Huron St., is now officially open to the public! Officials will hold a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Wednesday, Oct. 25, at 4 p.m. at the Municipal Court Main Entrance.

Following a short ceremony, attendees will have the opportunity to experience an escorted tour of the building, including select offices of the City Court, Knoxville Fire Department and Knoxville Police Department. Please note that attending these tours will require a security check at the entrance.

The new Knoxville Public Safety Complex is now the home of the Knoxville Police Department, Fire Department, E-911 Backup, Pension Board, and Municipal Court.

6. McClung Warehouse Redevelopment Meeting Set for Nov. 16

Mark your calendars! The City of Knoxville and Knoxville Community Development Corporation (KCDC) will host a community open house about redevelopment of the former McClung Warehouses on Thursday, Nov. 16, from 4-6:30 p.m. at The Standard, 416 W. Jackson Ave.

Residents are invited to attend at any time during open house hours to provide input on the redevelopment of the former McClung Warehouse site on Jackson Avenue. City staff and partners will be available to answer questions and collect feedback. Topics include: historical and existing land uses, site design, layout and programming, connectivity and public spaces.

Ideas and input from the open house will be used to inform programming and redevelopment of the site.

7. Advance Knox Shares Update

Advance Knox, a joint effort between Knox County and Knoxville Knox County Planning will share updates on Tuesday, Oct. 24, 5 p.m. in the Main Assembly Room of the City County Building, 400 Main St.

Advance Knox is a process to prepare a land use and transportation plan for Knox County that is informed by research and community input.

The updated Growth Plan is the first step of codifying the results of the Advance Knox Initiative, which will update the General Plan and later update the county zoning ordinances and development standards. These can have significant future impact for how our county and communities will look, and develop.

8. Knox Heritage Seeks to Fund Historic Preservation

Applications for the Knox Heritage Small Renovation Grant Program are now open! With support from the City of Knoxville's Historic Preservation Fund, Knox Heritage is looking to fund historic preservation through supporting rehabilitation, restoration, and repair projects in Knoxville.

The program opened on Oct. 1. Applications for grants up to \$2,500 will be considered on a first-come, first-serve basis and will be reviewed in order of their receipt.

To be eligible:

- Property must be located in an H or NC Historic Overlay within City of Knoxville limits
- Property must be owner-occupied; commercial or rental properties will not be considered at this time
- Property must be current with all City of Knoxville and Knox County taxes

14. October is Leave the Leaves Month

October is Leave the Leaves Month! As leaves change color and fall to the ground, you can create habitat right where you live. Did you know that leaving the leaves in your yard or garden not only saves you time and energy but also benefits wildlife?

Here are a few good reasons to put down the rake:

- Provide habitat for wildlife: Frogs, turtles, and salamanders rely on fallen leaves to provide cover and hibernation places; many moth and butterfly caterpillars overwinter in fallen leaves before emerging in spring.
- Provide food for wildlife: Creatures, like earthworms and millipedes, reside in (and decompose) leaf litter and are themselves a source of food for bigger wildlife like birds and toads.
- **Increase fertility of your soil:** Decomposing leaves add nutrients to your soil and also allow for greater water retention.

If you belong to a homeowners association (HOA) that requires homeowners to remove leaves, you can rake them into your garden beds to use as free mulch. If that is not an option, rake your leaves to the curb for City crews to collect during leaf season, which officially begins Nov. 6. Leaf piles collected by the City are used to make compost, so it is still going to good use.

Knoxville has been certified as a Community Wildlife Habitat through the National Wildlife Federation since 2017. By including articles about conservation in this newsletter, we help encourage others to be mindful of the environment and help keep our certification.
